508. Questions & Answers -- Phil A Telic:

Dear Phil ;

Enclosed is a photocopy of a cover I recently received that has two Lundy Isles labels on it - apparently postally used. My question is "What can you tell me about the background of Lundy Isles labels, what is their current status, why are they not mentioned in any catalogue, and where might I get more information on them?

I know very little about them so I can summarize

briefly as follows; I believe they are (were?) designed to pay for the costs of transporting a letter from the island to a regular British Post Office. However, they have (had?) no official recognition, hence the silence of the catalogues (no doubt). Recently, a number of other postally neglected islands have issued such labels, ie St Kilda, quite clearly in an effort to cash in on unwary collectors. I believe that the Lundy Isles labels, on the other hand, have a legitimate history and am quite interested in learning more about them.

I'm certain that other philatelists would be interested in what you can find on this curious and neglected area of the hobby as I am.

Dear Ian:

You not only present a very interesting philatelic question but your perception is very accurate. Your example of two Lundy Isles labels is an illustration of a non-postal charge for the handling of mail from a location not serviced by a federal postal station to a regular post office.

You are correct, they are fees charged for the costs of transporting a letter from Lundy Island to a regular British Post Office. It has no philatelic jurisdiction - it is similar to a tariff. It is the charge of a ferry boat operator or other person for carrying mail from a place not serviced by regular mail to a point which is. Since it is not technically postal, it is not listed in the philatelic catalogues.

We have a similar situation in the Kaulback Island off Nova Scotia where I understand a fee is charged to take a letter to the mainland.

Pethaps our readers can tell us where we can

find more information on this interesting aspect of non-postal postal history. Thanks for writing, Phil-A-Telic
