Ken of course has been involved in just about every aspect of our club having been the Program Chairman, President, RPSC Judge etc and is presently active in the Post Card Society as well as being the representative of the Postal History Society of Canada in the East Coast. #### 687. The President's Report -- Bob Vaison :

When we come to the end of a year's activities in the Nova Scotia Stamp Club, it is both sobering and encouraging to recall that this fine organization has been thriving for more than sixty years and indeed was the first affiliate of the ( now Royal ) Philatelic Society of Canada. We carry on a respectable tradition as one of the larger and longest operating stamp clubs in Canada. I will present my remarks to you under a number of headings;

Monthly Meetings -- As has been our norm for quite some time, we met on the second Tuesday of each month. Average attendance over the past year was about forty members, a most commendable figure. Under the able direction of our Program Chairman, Ron Lewis, each meeting featured appropriate philatelic edification as, for instance, an RPSC slide show, one-page exhibits, or wellappreciated talks by members of the Club. For contributing to the latter, special thanks are due to Doug Allen and Marty Zelenietz ( for their cable TV tape ). Marty again for " Stamps Used Abroad ", and Lloyd MacPherson for " Early N.S. Postmarks ". Each meeting as well, featured an auction of member's material and these were very competently handled by our two auctioneers, Peter Ineson and Stan Dunfield.

Annual Catalogue Auction -- Due to a low participation Level by the membership coupled with the relatively high cost, your Executive initiated and continued debate on this subject. It was decided to proceed with the event this year in a manner designed to reduce costs, and it was well administrated by Bob Fear. It must be noted that there were only 18 sellers and 22 buyers, statistics that perhaps continue to raise questions about this undertaking and it's efficacy. Thanks are due to Peter and Stan for their usual competence in auctioneering.

<u>1985 Annual Exhibition</u> -- On a brighter note, I must report that this Exhibition was a success from just about all angles. We had over 100 trames of exhibits on display, and a large and active bourse. It was estimated that about 500 people attended. The hard-working members deserving of our commendation for the Exhibition were as follows ;; General Chairman, Bob Fear ; Senior Exhibits, Bob Vaison ; Bourse, Gary Coolen ; Program BookLet, Hugh Junior Club -- While this is not normally considered to be a part of our Club I want to draw attention to the considerable amount of unselfish work done by Marilyn Murphy with the juniors. Future philatelists are bred of such efforts and Marilyn deserves our support, which I know has been forthcoming from some senior members in the form of donations of stamps, literature and so forth.

<u>Club Library</u> -- Over the years our Club has built up quite a respectable library of philatelic volumes, all of which are available to members for study. I would like to thank Hilda van Rooyen for her diligent library management. Among others, J.J. MacDonald's new book on the Nova Scotia Post has been added to our collection.

<u>Finances</u> -- An important aspect of any volunteer organization such as ours is finances and their proper administration. We were fortunate again this year to have someone of the calibre and dedication of Archie Thomas for this task. His report will be presented separately. Mention should also be made here of our auditor, Doug Allen.

<u>Club Newsletter</u> -- I am sure you will agree with me that we all owe George MacKenzie a large debt of gratitude for his untiring editorship of our Newsletter. George is retiring from the position this year after serving long and well, and we will miss his warm and sometimes humorous touches. Putting out a Newsletter is no mean feat : George has done it well. We have given him time off for exemplary behaviour.

<u>Club Secretaries</u> -- In this domain we have been well served by two gentleman - feminists please note. Peter Ineson has dutifully recorded and precerved the minutes of both Club and Executive meetings, and has done so cheerfully. Hugh Rathbun has capably handled the responsibilities of corresponding secretary in like admirable manner.

Other Achievements and Itens of Note -- This year, the Club drafted, discussed and implemented a new policy on Club Awards, one that should provide a sound basis in this area. Thanks are due again to indefatigable Marilyn Murphy and her ad-hoc committee.

Our annual Christmas Cheer auction last fall realized about \$263.00, all of which was donated by the Club to a pair of worthy charities. Many members contributed lots for this good cause.

A money-raising innovation this year were our philatelic coasters, which we sold at the Exhibition and at Club meetings. Virtually all have been disposed of, earning a tidy sum for Club expenses. Recognition must be accorded Hugh Rathbun for his work in this regard.

Enough by way of information and statistics. This fine Club of ours has always functioned at it's high level because of the volunteer efforts of some of it's members - this year is a good example. When future Executive call for people to assist with this or that function, please consider volunteering your help. I can report from my own involvement that it is a fine experience. I have thoroughly enjoyed my two years as your President, and I thank you for your support.

# 683. The Treasurer's Report -- Archie Thomas :

Due to the length of the treasurer's report, it will be condensed as in past years. Expenses which includes the Annual Exhibition (1985), Newsletter, Postage, Coffee Cups, Stamp Auctions etc came to \$ 7.434.30. Receipts which include Annual Exhibition (1985) and some from (1986), membership dues, Stamp Auctions etc came to \$ 7,223.99. All this came to a loss of \$ 210.31 for the year.Our present bank balance is \$ 5,186.92. One item of note is that membership due brought in \$ 1,907.41 while the cost of the Newsletter was \$ 1,771.93 which has been the norm for many, many years ; the membership dues covers the cost of the Newsletter.

## 691. A German Panorama -- Doug Casey :

( cont'd from Newsletter #169 )

For various reasons the Russians initiated a blockade of Berlin on June 24th, 1943. All goods had to be flown into and out of the Western sector. This was expensive and in order to assist in providing funds a tax of 20fg was levied on all postal matter in the Anglo-American Zones. This was subsequently extended to the French Zone and later the Federal Republic. The tax was denoted by the use of a small label which had no franking ability on its own but which was compulsory on all mail. There were certain exceptions



to requirements for it's use. Earliest issues were imperforate and there are colour and perforation varieties, with the result that it provides a study within itself. It was required for use generally from December 1st, 1948, to March 31st, 1956, although there were variations in certain areas.

Ed's Note : A wrap-up of Doug's first section on Germany will appear in the next Newsletter outlining the numerous philatelic possibilities to be found in a study of this country.

The Bill Stephenson Award for best British Colonies except Canada and Provinces was won by Marty Zelenietz.

The Nova Scotia Stamp Club Award for an outstanding contribution to the advancement of philately in Nova Scotia was won by George MacKenzie.

There were no winners of the <u>Halifax Herald Limited Nova Scotia</u> <u>Philatelic Heritage Award</u> in either the Senior or Junior Exhibits. There was no winner of the <u>Novice Award</u> this year.

The positive aspects of this year's show once again are many and the only item that could use more participation is in the Senior exhibiting. Last year 19 members put in 84 frames but instead of increasing this year it was reduced to only 62 frames by 13 members. The overall frame total last year was 111 by 28 members while this year it was 96 frames by 26 members. The good news was the Court of Honor which had 15 additional trames this year. Once again the set-up went like clockwork and it was finalized by 8.30 and the the judges were able to go home fairly early. As always, many thanks to Ken, Marilyn and Stu for the outstanding job done in selecting the winners.

## 694. Executive Meeting -- Minutes :

The first meeting of the newly elected Executive of the Nova Scotia Stamp Club was held on Monday, April 21st, 1986. The following items of business were brought forward and discussed;

<u>Coasters</u> -- Evidentally the final seven coasters were sold at the Exhibition. Hugh Rathbun was not present at the meeting but the remaining sets were sold early and we could have sold more if they had been available. As a result the Executive will be looking at purchasing probably another 100 in the fall as a set series has been produced featuring birds. The coasters have been a money earner for the club so should be followed up.


<u>3rd Director</u> -- As it is the Executive's responsibility to select the third director, four names were put forward in order of preference and the President will contact the applicable people so see who will accept this position.

Volunteer Positions -- It is also the Executive's duty to select members to fill numerous positions so the following members will be contacted to see if they will look after specific duties ; <u>Program Organizer</u> - John Hall (firm, he has accepted ), <u>Auctioneers</u> -Pete Ineson & Stan Dunfield, <u>Librarian</u> - Hilda Van Rooyan, <u>Auditor</u> -Doug Allen, <u>Expertizers</u> - Marilyn Murphy and Marilyn will get at least one more, <u>Auction Table</u> - Ron Lewis & Larry Hitz, <u>Coffee</u> -Jane Cooper and <u>Archivist</u> - Marilyn Murphy. With the exception of John Hall, other members selected for positions may have a reason for not accepting so don't feel bad if you've been Left out at this time, we may be back.

Membership -- George MacKenzie announced that Club has dropped from 250 to about 212 in the past few years and he volunteered his services to try and get more new members. This would involve a special new members meeting in mid-September with two or three Executive members outlining all the advantages of the club and the facilities and programs available. Another responsibility would be to get pertinent information from interested parties before each meeting and introduce new members or interested collectors instead of having them introduce themselves as is now the procedure. In a brief discussion other  $E_x$  ecutive members telt this was a good idea as they have noticed that new members are sort of shunted aside if they don't have that specific speciality and a lot of new people will stay in their seat when the President calls for new members to arise. Approval was given George to come up with a position name and procedures he will follow.

<u>Bidding on your own Lots</u> -- The President announced that he had been requested to bring this item forward as to the pros and cons of bidding on your own lots. After a spirited discussion it was decided that any member that puts material in any of our auctions should not attempt to set a specific price on it by bidding it up. In the case of a reserve bid auction, put the reserve bid at the price you want, it it's an unreserved auction, don't put it in if you want a certian price for it. The decision of the Executive is that anybody found bidding on their own material will be notfied by the President that they have lost the privilege of putting material in our auctions

Dear Phil ; Why the Overprint ? For what occasion ? Are they considered a revenue stamp ? How many were overprinted ? Wondering

Dear Wondering ; I have wondered this one around for quite some time and the only answers I can come up with have come from an not so old sage. The overprint was an official one done by Canada Post for a show in Montreal. This was the first and only time Canada Post did this and they are not considered a revenue stamp. The total amount overprinted is not definately known but it is believed to be in the order of 20,000 perhaps.
