EDITORIAL

Finding A Speciality

When embarking upon your first philatelic journey, choose a destination. It is easy to purchase a large packet of worldwide stamps and a larger worldwide album. Is it wise? I think not.

Attend a meeting of the Stamp Club, talk to people, snoop around. Go to the library, read books, study catalogues. Brouse the bourse, delve into your dealer's domain. Don't spend a dime until you've answered the vital question, "What do I collect?".

The answer shouldn't be "Just stamps.". What country, what century, even what issue, all are worth considering. Choose an angle!

Stick to your chosen field. Resist impulses to wander through other countries, dabble in topicals, or pick up a few first day covers. Lay your foundation!

Focus is important. A definite, attainable goal gives a sense of accomplishment to your collection. A sharply defined field of interest can cut your collecting budget, or give added punch to your stamp dollars. Go deep, not wide.

Within a few years you will build a first rate collection. Opportunities for exhibitions will present themselves. Ultimate salability should increase, if that is also your goal. Your pleasure will be enhanced as you dig deeper into your chosen field. Research, papers, perhaps even a book. All are possible. Specialize! Get started now!

If you are interested in what they have to offer, ask them to send it to you on approval. Most reputable dealers would be happy to oblige.

BNAPS- EXCLUSIVE COVERAGE; CHRISTMAS STAMPS = NEW ARTICLE

Locally, the judges try to encourage collecting and exhibiting by awarding medals to those exhibits which show merit in the appropriate catagories. Judges may reclassify exhibits (e.g., from BNA to Postal History), and grant lesser awards to those exhibitors who, although not deserving of a medal, should be encouraged to develop their exhibits.

The <u>Presentation</u> or format used to show the material should be pleasing to the eye, consistent, and follow one frame to the next. Remember that filled frames guide the interest but crowsed frames lose it.

Research and Study should show an understanding deeper than catalogue numbers of the use of or reason for issuing the stamp. Deeper research may go into the various papers, colours, printing companies, on cover uses such as rates and routes, etc.

Collecting Challenge must be included at this point. A collection of George V values is harder to obtain than a complete collection of present day issues. This must be considered.

Condition of the material is of lesser importance. Off centre, damaged cheap stamps should be replaced, and shades of colour shown with mint stamps. It may also be better to exclude a stamp or item than to show a photocopy unless it is the reverse of an item you have on display.

 $\underline{\text{Value}}$ is of little concern at the local show level although better items cannot be overlooked.

To continue with soaking; Whatever the hazards of protecting the fronts of stamps from the effect of water, you shouldn't experience many problems with gum. Modern soluble adhesives dissappear readily so that the stamps are virtually gum-free when it comes to laying them out, face downwards on a clean white blotting paper to dry. Several layers of stamps and blotting paper can be carefully stacked, and you may also put a heavy book on top to help press the stamps flat. Some caution is advised. Make sure that the book is large enough to cover the blotting paper completely or you may find a nasty ridge or crease. Personally, I find a few old newspapers do the trick just as effectively. The main thing is not to remove the stamps from the blotting paper too soon, or have them in too warm an atmosphere when you do, or else your stamps may curl.

The gum used for some of the older stamps was much more of a headache. Some Central European and South American countries, in particular, had stamps whose gum refused to dissolve gracefully and hung around like viscuous blobs which had to be gently rinsed off or even gingerly rubbed off with the fingers. Probably the worst offender was Austria, whose Pre-World War One were notorious for the color, taste and sheer grunginess of their gum. There is an apocryphal story of a chap coming home very late one night and finding a bowl standing in the kitchen with what he took to be a snack of cold fish soup left out for him. In the morning he complimented his parents only to be informed that he had drank a mixture of Austrian stamps left to soak. (Old-time cabinetmakers used an adhesive known as fish glue. Perhaps there was some relation? - Ed.) TO BE CONTINUED...




SEPTEMBER EXECUTIVE MEETING

It is more important that the 1/2 penny impressed is the addition of the red orange one half penny stamp which is perfinned C/AN/S with the AN being very large. The cancels transit stamps and receiving stamps are also very interesting. Two early LONDON squared circles. type A index 25 lower corners of 8:30 pm, DEC 20, 99; transfer stamp of SEA POST OFFICE B JA. 1 00 and receiving stamp of Amritsar at 6:30 AM Dely JAN 9:00. Lastly, we have all heard of the Golden Temple at Amritsar in the past few years.
