# THEMATIC \ TOPICAL COLLECTING

At our last meeting, Marty Zelenietz spoke about his hunt for stamps featuring "Birds I have Seen." The area of topical or thematic collecting is full of possibilities and, as Marty explained, can be pursued using whatever guidelines you give yourself.



According to 'the rules' of exhibiting, topical and thematic collections are slightly different. Topical exhibits consist of stamps or other philatelic items which feature an image of subject area – so in Marty's case, each item features an image of a bird he

has seen. Thematic collections are broader and can cover the bird, its environment, its food, migration patterns, cultural uses and meanings and so on. Having said that, how and what you



choose to collect is up to you and your preferences.

Experienced thematic collectors talk about 'Thematic Elements', these are items which are generally acceptable in a thematic collection. The overarching idea is that the items or 'elements' of the collection be created by a



postal administration. When you start to think about it, the list of 'elements' is vast – I have a list which includes over 200 different 'elements'. Beyond stamps, these include booklets, postmarks, meter marks, errors, covers, postal stationery and the list goes on. Under the strictest rules, this eliminates

most postcards (those privately produced) and revenue stamps (as they were issued for fiscal not postal use),

but it is your collection and you can do what you want with it.

For a new collector or a collector new to topical/thematic collecting, the options are endless. Thinking about the interests of current and former Nova Scotia Stamp Club members,



I recall collections of children's literature, Scotland, the stamp designer Cseslaw Slania; Nelson; Sports; Animals; Birds; the Red Cross; Joint Issues; Christmas; and Apples.





Many collections are built around other hobbies or interests of the collectors and one positive is that when you are beginning there is an abundance of material to find often for very reason-



able prices. Another plus is that this material can be found at club auctions, stamp fairs as well as through on-line sources.



There are many resources available on the internet about thematic collecting from general guides and YouTube presentations to clubs like the American Topical Association to subject specific lists and guides. The Digital Philate-






# **PHYSICS OR STAMP COLLECTING**

Membership is C\$15 per person (C\$20 US, C\$25 International) or C\$22.50 per couple



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#### CANADA POST INTERNAL HANDSTAMPS #21

The locally produced attached cover is a tale of two stories, the first regarding the Opening by the Foreign Exchange Control Board in Halifax per the District Director of Postal Services / I. D. handstamp. The second part deals with the massive number of handstamps and notations due to an Insufficient Address to New York, NY, USA.

The Foreign Exchange Control Board (FECB) was created on September 15, 1939, immediately after Canada entered WWII. The purpose of the FECB was to control the flow of foreign exchange. The FECB and its regulations remained in force until December 14, 1951<sup>1</sup>. Foreign Exchange Controls were in full force due to the Second World War to make sure that funds were not leaving the country to devalue the dollar even in small amounts.





As described in the past the D. L. 1 labels were originally used as they were on hand. Once the supply was exhausted, similar special designed labels were used by the FECB labelled I—B--... The first printing of the labels was dated February 15, 1940 although "it appears that it remained until April 2, 1940 for the labels to be formally put to use by directive of the Acting Chief of Post Office Services"<sup>2</sup>. A second printing of the labels was done in 1942.

Once examined the labels were used to seal the envelope and a handstamp applied usually by the District Director of Postal Services office. PASSED FOR EXPORT was the final imprint applied allowing it to be forwarded. For Halifax there are many different handstamps used with different initials such as E. S., I. D., O. S., O. S. S., and S. D.

Of the 32 different notations and handstamps ten separate dated handstamps from N. Y. appear on the backside between Dec 28 to Dec 31, 1940 to keep track of when this item was handled and re-handled.

In summary: Glace Bay, N.S. Dec 24 1940 registered letter to New York, NY, USA. Notation made by the post office of a 3-cent stamp missing / fell off OK \*\*. Examined by the Foreign Exchange Control Board label I—B.—20,000 sheets—15-2-40 at Halifax, N.S. by the I.D. or Inspection Division or Investigation Division on Dec 26. PASSED FOR EXPORT. Upon receipt in New York, it was marked with various handstamps not found, not at 1492 comm Ave. R30 6774, 878 Mass, Try 1492 etc. evidenced by several New York backstamps then marked Returned for Better Address / G. P. O. N. Y. Reg. Div., Insufficient Address and pointing finger RETURNED TO SENDER in Glace Bay, N.S. These various attempts to deliver give some indication to the number of convents serving New York City in the war period.
