A SUMMER'S DAY ON THE NORTHWEST ARM - THE CANADIAN PHILATELIC ASSOCIATION CONVENTION, JULY 31 - AUGUST 3, 1889

135 years ago this summer, Canada's earliest organized philatelic club, the Canadian Philatelic Association (CPA), wrapped up their 2nd Annual Convention with a gala cruise on Halifax's Northwest Arm on Saturday August 3, 1889. After the excursion, the twelve participants posed for a photo (Figure 1) arranged by my great-grandfather and the CPA's 2nd President Henry Hechler. Photography was a side business for Hechler who had originally found work when he first arrived in Halifax in 1873 in a photographer's studio.

The small turnout of only twelve for the meeting was not un-

The APA (predecessor to the APS) had its 4th convention in St Louis that fall and only had 17 members present³ and when the CPA would meet again in Montreal in 1890, there were only 11 in attendance, one fewer than at the meeting in Halifax.⁴

The trip on the Northwest Arm received rave reviews in the Dominion Philatelist, which had taken over the role of the organization's official publication from the Halifax Philatelist that same summer: I am informed on the highest authority that the picnic excursion to which the Halifax members entertained the visiting brethren on Saturday 4th, August, was very much enjoyed. The trip down the harbor and around the beautiful North West Arm must have been delightful in the fine government steam launch which was used for the occasion. Too much cannot be said in praise of the caterer for the party. He provided everything that could be desired, with a lavish hand. In fruits, there were oranges, bananas, pears. For drinks there was beer, ale, lemonade, soda, etc., etc., and to crown all, an elegant lunch. Even the President's weakness for Limburger was not forgotten. In fact, nothing was wanting to render the excursion one of the most pleasant we have heard described. The delegates indulged their fancies for mixed drinks to the fullest extent, even a decoction of lemonade with the limpid waters of the Nor. West arm was attempted with more or less success. But privately the writer is of the opinion that only the Maritime members indulged in the last-named compound, and attributes it to their superior knowledge of the best way of overcoming the much-dreaded Mal-de-mer probably on the principle of "swallowing a hair of the dog that bit you," or it is just possible that in the excitement of the moment they forgot that while in sight of freshwater, they were sailing on the briny deep. A very enjoyable feature of the days outing was a photograph of the party taken by our worthy president, Mr. Hechler, who is an amateur artist of considerable repute...Mention must also be made of another pleasing portion of the entertainment. I allude to the splendid singing with which the Halifax members regaled their quests upon the homeward trip. To particularize is perhaps unjust, but I feel that it is due the party to say that such a tenor as Mr. DeWolfe deserves special mention, while Mr. Crane with his deep, full bass, cannot be passed without a word, and then such a chorus when the rest of the party joined in. The visitors sat entranced (probably too full for utterance) as the beautiful melody echoed and re-echoed, far across the magnificent harbor.5

The photo from the outing does capture a bit of the fun of that afternoon. But in contrast to most of those in the photo who look jovial, Hechler reclining at the lower right in the photo, seems to be a million miles away.

The meeting had been disappointment for him as he was soundly defeated in his attempt at re-election to the Presidency, being bested by fellow Nova Scotian J.A. Craig, a druggist from Yarmouth. The tally was 52 votes for Craig to 21 for Hechler (in addition to the twelve members present, multiple members carried

proxies for those not present). For most of the year leading up to the meeting in Halifax there had been a campaign in the Dominion Philatelist suggesting that the President should not be a stamp dealer and implying that Hechler was deriving a business benefit from the office. The campaign succeeded in turning the majority of the members against Hechler.

In addition to his discouragement over the outcome of the meeting, Hechler's mind may also have been elsewhere for in less than a week, on August 10th, he was to take the S.S. Damara from Halifax bound for London on a trip he had been planning for many months and that would be the one return trip of his lifetime to Europe and his native Germany.

In contrast to the CPA Convention, his European trip was a terrific success and Hechler reported taking orders for Canadian stamps nearly every day. After a week in London, where he met Stanley Gibbons, he next travelled to the World's Exposition in Paris where he visited the newly opened Eifel Tour before making his way to his hometown of Darmstadt Germany. Staying at the home of his older sister Käthe and her husband, he made Darmstadt his base of operations for his three-month visit which included side trips to many other cities including Leipzig, Vienna and Rome. He also made weekly visits to see his older brother Wilhelm who was living in Frankfurt am Main.

As was his custom when he travelled, he left self-addressed covers (Figure 2) at home for the family to use in sending him news.

In November before his return trip, he wrote to his younger brother Anton, then living in the Colorado mining town of St. Elmo - a ghost town today. Having a beer at Hildebrand's, a famous brewery, he used the post card as beer mat and wrote that he hoped Anton could at least smell the good German beer. The faint circular outline of the beer stain is still visible on the card today (Figure 3).

Before he left for Europe, Hechler put the affairs of the CPA in the hands of Craig asking him to fill in for the remaining months of his term.

> But his relationship to this version of the CPA was never the same. The or-

ganization struggled over the next few years largely due to challenges in the exchange department which handled circuit books sent to members and also dwindling membership. Henry Hechler himself was dropped from the rolls in 1892 due to his failure to pay his

dues. One can easily imagine his indifference to the fortunes of the CPA after his resounding and embarrassing defeat in the 1889 election. But when the CPA was resurrected in 1910 after two successor organizations (the Dominion Philatelic Association and the League of Canadian Philatelists) folded, Henry Hechler was selected to serve as the first President of the newly reconstituted society.⁸
