#### **CANADA POST DEPATRMENT HANDSTAMPS #22**

POST OFFICE Ottawa, Canada. JUL 2 1941 CITY DELIVERY.

39mm x 27mm, proofed Nov 4 1939 Seriffed,

1st & 3rd line caps, 2nd line mixed, period after 'Canada.' & 'DELIVERY.',

A copy of the proof of this handstamp is shown on the left above. To the right is a copy from the lower cover of a similar but not the same handstamp. There is no proof known for this handstamp.

The key difference between them is the length of the first line 'POST OFFICE' as compared to the second line 'Ottawa, Canada.' as it is longer in the proof and 1 cent postage due cover and shorter in the 1935 issue cover.

City Delivery is the distinction depending upon population size of a town or city between that and Rural Delivery. Surprisingly, not many cit-

ies used handstamps with the wording 'City Delivery'.

Several subsections with the words 'City Delivery' can also exist such as Branch, Directory, Evening, Head Clerk, Mail, Parcel Post, Registration,

With regards to the 1941 cover, a 1 cent postage due fee (simple deficiency) was charged as the item was sent by air mail from the United States. In earlier years, such as in the case of the cover from 1935, postage due stamps paid the separate Special Delivery fee of 10 cents that was required in Canada.

#### **UNIVERSAL POSTAL UNION 1874-2024**

There is a significant postal anniversary in 2024, the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Universal Postal Union.

Rowland Hill's 1840 reforms in Great Britain had revolutionised the inland postal system and subsequently the principles had been adopted by several other countries. The international mail system was still chaotic. It was complex involving agreements and charges by the countries through which the mail passed. Each country had its own postal arrangements. On the initiative of Montgomery Blair, USA, and Heinrich von Stephan, Germany, international conferences were held in 1863 in Paris and in 1874 in Berne. The Berne conference resulted in the formation of the General Union of Posts (GPU) with 22 member countries which were mainly European but included the USA and Egypt. The Union was based in Berne. The name was changed to the Universal Postal Union at the 1878 conference in Paris.

The Universal Postal Union (UPU) is now a specialized agency of the United Nations and still based in Berne. There are currently 192 members of the UPU.

To mark this anniversary on 30 May 2024 the UN Postal Administration issued three stamps illustrating aspects of mail delivery: 68¢ (US \$) - a dove carrying a letter, 1.20 CHF (Swiss francs) a postal worker delivering mail, € 0.95 (euros) a plane carrying airmail. The UN stamps can be purchased from shops at UN headquarters in New York, Geneva and Vienna, where they can be used for postage, and online at www.unstamps.org.

## **GASS 2024**

The Great American Stamp Show was held from August 15-18, 2024 in Hartford, CT. The show is a combined show of the American Philatelic Society, the American Topical Association and the American First Day Cover Society as well as being the host of the Champion of Champions Competition. The four days of the show were jam-packed with meeting, seminars, meet and greets and there were over 70 dealers with extensive stock offerings. With 120 competitive exhibits, a panel of 12 jurors (including two Canadians - Charles Verge and Jane Sodero) judged the exhibits in all categories awarding traditional medals and picking Multi-Frame Grand and Reserve Grand and Single Frame Grand awards for each of the three sections of the show. The jury was also charged with selecting the Champion of Champions from 22 exhibits which had garnered a Grand Award at one of the World Series of Philately shows held across the United States or at a Canadian National show. There were two Canadians participating in the Champion of Champions competition: Jean Wang with her exhibit "BLOOD: A Modern Medicine" and Stuart Reddington with his exhibit "Line Engraved Issues of Great Britain 1840 & 1841". #### PROPOSAL: CHANGE IN MEMBER DUES

In June 2024, a proposal was put before the Nova Scotia Stamp Club Executive for a new membership fee structure. In the past most of your membership dues went to the cost of the mailing the newsletter (including printing, envelope and postage). In recent years almost 90% of the members have switched to notification by email of the newsletter being posted on the website.

A review of the membership dues is a Club constitutional requirement...

7. The annual membership dues for all classes of membership will be reviewed by the executive annually. A recommendation to change membership dues will be published in the earliest Newsletter possible and recorded for the reading of the minutes. Any change in the membership dues must then be approved by a majority vote of the attending quorum at the next regularly scheduled Club meeting.

In August, the Club Executive, approved the proposal in time for Novapex. Since the proposal is to <u>lower</u> fees, the Executive felt that there was low risk to implement the change for Novapex while still fulfilling the need for publication and member vote on the issue as prescribed by the constitution.

#### The Proposal

The proposal provides two major changes 1) to reduce the Member and Family fees for those you receive the newsletter electronically, and 2) to remove a stated fee for US and International members with a note of cost recovery for a printed mail out by arrangement.

Electronic Newsletter (new)

Member \$10 CAD per year

Family \$15 CAD per year

Printed Newsletter (unchanged)

Member \$15 CAD per year

Family \$22.50 CAD per year

US and International (new)

Members outside Canada can receive printed newsletters by mail by making special arrangements with the club to cover the cost of mail outs.

## The Vote

A vote on the proposal by the members will take place at the next meeting of the Club on September 10, 2024. A quorum of 15 members will need to be in attendance.
