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# EXHIBITION WATCH: George Lafontaine, Chairman

As you all know, the NSSC Annual Exhibition (Novapex '90) will be held Saturday, April 7 and Sunday, April 8 at the Lord Nelson Hotel. The Exhibition Committee met Feb. 20 for a progress report and to put their final ideas into action. The following is a brief update on the various committees.

SENIOR and JUNIOR EXHIBITS. With only a little over one month left before the show, please send your entry forms (see last Newsletter) in to Heinz Kircher as soon as possible. The deadline for entry is March 30. Remember you don't need to have your exhibit completed before you enter, only the title and number of frames are required at this stage. Hopefully we can match last year's record of 120 frames.

BOURSE: Ken MacDonald reports that nine dealers have confirmed that they will be at the show, and three more are contemplating coming. If you know of a dealer who may be interested in selling at the bourse, please let Ken know at the next meeting, or phone me at 864-1824.

PROGRAM/ADVERTISING: All is proceeding well in the program with about \$500 in ads sold so far, but we can still use more. If you or anyone you know wishes to place an ad, please let me know before March 1 since the program will be printed shortly thereafter.

<u>PUBLICITY</u>: Thanks go to Russell Saulnier who has cleared the way for bilingual posters to be displayed in local Post Offices. I will also be bringing in several posters to the next general meeting for members to display on work bulletin boards, windows, etc.

LAYOUT/DESIGN: Dave Harvey reports that 25 panes of new plexiglass have been bought for the frames. The frames were also painted and repaired Feb. 18.

BANQUET: Speaker will be Marla Hillier, tickets: Senior \$20, Junior \$10, details follow in separate Newsletter item.

<u>CLUB TABLE</u>: Raymond During is still accepting volunteers to help greet visitors and pass out programs. The job is not difficult; there will be no money collected and all that is required is a smiling face and two hours of your time either on Saturday or Sunday.

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Notes on Judging - J.C. Michaud

The following notes are intended to help the exhibitor by sharing with him the guidelines by which the judges will appraise their exhibit.

There are 3 levels of exhibition; Local, National and International. Here, we are concerned with the local level. At this level, judges are not expected to be experts in all fields, but they must judge all entries. The emphasis is placed on what the exhibitor has done with the material at his disposal. Thus, importance is placed on Presentation, Research and Study, Collecting Challenge, and Condition. These vary in importance, according to the type of exhibit, as seen below.

- Presentation Philately is a visual hobby, the postal item is the most important item on the page and must be shown in a tasteful manner. The exhibit should tell a story from page to page and frame to frame. Eye appeal is very important, expecially for Topical exhibits.

  Points.....Traditional & Postal History 35

  Topical 45
- Research & Study Your exhibit should show at least the basic published information, original research being the ultimate. For Topical exhibits, knowledge of the subject is most important, but some basic philatelic knowledge is also expected. Points...Traditional 35

  Topical 25(Subject) 5(Philatelic)
- <u>Collecting Challenge</u> How easy or difficult was it to form the collection.

  Points.....Traditional 15

  Topical 10
- Condition Damaged, off-centred, badly cancelled Postal items are downgraded, especially if the items are readily available in VF condition.

  Points.....Traditional 15

  Topical 15

I hope that these few notes will help you achieve your goal in this years' exhibition. Remember, when you exhibit at this level you must meet all of these factors if you want to be successful. Most important, you <u>must</u> show your postal items in a tasteful manner and you <u>must</u> tell the judges what you know by putting it down on your pages. GOOD LUCK.



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# ADMIRALS ON COVER:



AT POINT OF MAILING

LONDON, E. C. 4, ENGLAND.

The Empire rate to the United Kingdom was 2¢ per ounce at the commencement of the Admiral era. Due to World War I the rate was increased by 1¢ (the war tax) on April 15. On October 1, 1921, the rate was again increased to 3¢ per ounce or fraction thereof (now 4¢).

On July 1, 1926 the war tax or 1¢ was removed and the Empire rate was reduced to 3¢. The Empire rate of 2¢ would not be seen again until December 25, 1928 when the 2¢ Imperial Penny Postage was again restored.

This cover has the correct rate,  $10 \neq \text{Registration}$  fee plus  $3 \neq \text{for 1}$  ounce postage plus  $1 \neq \text{war tax}$ . Two  $7 \neq \text{yellow}$  ochre were used.

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BARBADOS: The Seal of the Colony. Cliff Abram

A Royal warrant was issued for a Public Seal in 1663, the warrant stated that the device was to express the King's Sovereignty on the British seas. The work was entrusted to Thomas Simon, chief engraver to the mint, the seal bore on the obverse "His Majesties Royal effigies representing Neptune in a chariot drawn by two Sea Horses and robed with his Royal robes. Crowned, with a Trident in his right hand". With the motto inscribed: "ET PENITUS TOTO REGNANTES ORBE BRITTANOS". It should be noted, that when the Sovereign is a Queen, the figure is represented as standing in the chariot, but if a King, the figure is seated.

When the Seal was used for the first time on a postage stamp in 1892, Queen

Victoria, being the reigning sovereign was depicted as standing. There is no motto shown on this stamp.





Barbados, unlike many of the Colonies, did not issue any stamps bearing the effigy of King Edward VII, but continued to use the existing issue of Queen Victoria standing in the chariot. The first issue of a definitive set bearing the effigy of King George V was in 1912, but, through an oversight they retained the same Seal as for the 1892 issue, showing the Queen standing in the chariot.

In the 1916 set, the opportunity was taken to correct the Seal, and the new Seal now bore the effigy of King George V, seated in the chariot. The motto has been added, and the horses have been replaced by new ones. The nearside horse is turning his head to view a paddle wheel that has been added.
