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PROGRAMME, MAY 14, 1991

NOVAPEX '91: The first part of the programme will feature the presentation of awards and certificates of participation pertaining to Novapex '91.

STAMPWORLD LONDON '90: In late 1988, Doug Allen announced that he would be interested in organizing a group tour to STAMPWORLD LONDON '90 being held at Alexandra Palace, London, England, to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the first postage stamp, the "Penny Black". Interest was immediately evident, so Doug carried out his promise, and the end result was that 32 people left the Halifax International Airport, May 2, 1990 bound for Heathrow Airport, London.

At the August 27, 1990 Executive meeting, the president, George MacKenzie stated, as this was the first group tour ever taken by the Club, it should be documented by a slide programme for future reference and/or programming purposes. The Executive agreed and approved funding for George to produce the programme. As it was a group tour, participating members were asked to provide photos they felt best portrayed their trip highlights.

We would like to present, as part 2 of the May 14 programme, for your enjoyment, a selection of 50 slides covering this event. The slides are divided into four parts: the trip over, STAMPWORLD LONDON '90. London itself, and excursions outside London. 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NOVAPEX '91 WRAP-UP, George MacKenzie

The annual Exhibition, which was held this year at the Dartmouth Masonic Centre, April 13 and 14, drew approximately 325 visitors and was considered a success by all concerned. This figure is down slightly from last year, however, those in attendance were really interested collectors who kept the bourse and display areas buzzing most of the time. Many compliments were heard regarding the facilities, lighting, free parking and good food at reasonable prices both during the daytime and at the banquet. Although off the beaten track, very few people stated they had a hard time finding it.

DEALERS: Eleven dealers were able to make the show and all agreed that the lighting and homey atmosphere made their stay enjoyable. All were satisfied with their sales that seemed to come in spurts instead of a steady flow.

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BLACK BLOTS AGAIN: Bob Vaison

Recently the philatelic press has devoted some attention to the latest efforts to issue and publicize "blacklists" of stamps of questionable postal utility and/or validity issued by a variety of (perhaps dubious) postal entities around the world. Most of us may well be inclined - as I am - to say "Yes, and amen" to such efforts by organizations like the Federation Internationale Philatelique (FIP) and the international group of stamp catalogue publishers. However it may be sobering to recall past efforts at such blackballing, as a recent column by stamp columnist Larry McInnis suggested in the Montreal Gazette.

McInnis recalls that in the 1890's several series were blacklisted, including the American Trans-Mississippi issue and our famous Queen Victoria Jubilee set. On the latter, <u>Stanley Gibbons Monthly Journal</u> (30 June 1897) had this to say: "a set of labels, including unnecessarily high values and printed in limited numbers to be issued concurrently with the present stamps is to reproduce all the most objectional features of the unnecessary and speculative emissions, which we all desire to put an end to". This "despicable issue" (their words) today catalogues at several thousand dollars and is much sought after.

Times change, and so do collecting interests. Each of us must make our own decisions.

BARBADOS CHARITY LABELS: Cliff Abram

In my collection of covers from Barbados, there are some with Charity labels affixed, these labels have an interesting period especially during WWII. A friend of mine did some research on these labels for an article in the British Caribbean Philatelic Group Journal, from this I shall use some exerpts for this article.

The Barbados Publicity Committee, fore-runner of the Tourist Board, produced these labels originally in early 1938. They thought that when the labels were affixed to mail from the Island, they would advertise Barbados as a tourist attraction and increase visitors. These labels, it is thought, were made in the U.S.A. in sheets of 24 (4x6), having six designs, each design having in the vignette a view of the island, these being in black and white and the outer frame in colour, red, blue, or yellow. They were perforated 11.

In November 1940, the Barbados Voluntary War Workers Association were looking for ideas whereby they could help the British Red Cross. The following exerpt from a local paper in Dec. 1940 explains:

The Barbados Publicity Committee has most generously given the Voluntary War Wrkers Association their entire supply of gummed seals to be sold in aid of Red Cross Funds. These seals take the form of views of Barbados and the Voluntary War Workers Association are having a small red cross stamped in a corner of each seal. The seals are in sheets of 24 and will cost 12 pence a sheet, or six seals for 4 pence, they are most attractive and if sent overseas will help the Red Cross and advertise the island.

To date however, only those labels with the edges in blue or yellow have been seen to have the red cross on them. Several years of research has gone into this label, so it must be assumed that the red labels were already disposed of by the Publicity Committee prior to handing the remainder over in November.

The two covers shown here (75% actual size) are dated as follows: the first, a red label without the cross was mailed on Aug. 5, 1939; the second, with the red cross is dated Nov 16, 1939, two days after they were put on sale by the Barbados Voluntary W.W. Association.



GERMAN STAMP CLUB: We are now receiving the German Stamp Club Newsletter.

COVER OF THE MONTH: Dave Cooper

This is a used South Africa air mail postal item addressed to Miss Margaret Hawkings, Nurses Residence, Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal and is from F/O Hollway, J.W. "In Transit". It is franked by an imprinted 3D Suid-Afrika and has been opened and censored. The Flight Officer advises: "I am really a long ways from home and still a long ways to go. The cancel is a mute cancel and neither this nor the violet circle in the body with ? T A in the centre indicates the sending office.

The contents indicate he arrived via boat and "can just walk outside and pick all the bananas & oranges we can eat". They had a rickshaw race down the streets of Durban and there are poisonous snakes & monkeys. As he also states he is not allowed to go over 100 miles from camp it is quite certain he was at time of mailing on the south-east corner of the Union of South Africa.

Organizing the show required two years of work. There were 240, 16 page frames of National and Club Exhibits. The exhibitors came from across the U.S. and Canada - applications were received that would have filled another 70 frames. Additional frames had to be borrowed from Ottawa and Quebec City clubs. Meetings of various attending groups occupied every moment of the three day show. The awards for the top winners were soapstone carvings modelled on stamps issued by Canada Post. This show also celebrated the 50th Anniversary of Dorval Airport the 100th Anniversary of the City of Dorval and the 30th Anniversary of the Lakeshore Stamp Club.
