### **Prince Consort Essays Great Britain**

The image of Prince Albert, the Prince Consort, has appeared on some of the earliest stamps of the Province of Canada, and on a Newfoundland stamp, but it did not appear on any British stamps. In Britain the Prince Consort essays were produced, but were not valid for postage.

The first stamps were produced in sheets without perforations. The sheets had to be cut with scissors by postal clerks in dimly lit offices. Hence it is difficult to find good copies of the imperforate stamps with four margins. Means were needed to be able to separate the stamps more readily.

One of the first attempts was made by Henry Archer in 1848 by using rouletting, in which a toothed wheel makes cuts in the paper. This was not successful and was followed later in the same year by an experimental perforating machine, also designed by Henry Archer. For various reasons the initial prototype was unsuccessful. The size of the stamp sheets was not uniform. During the preparation of the line engraved stamps the paper was dampened for the recess printing and consequently expanded and then contracted on drying, On treatment with the gum solution a similar expansion and contraction occurred. The gummed paper was more brittle and more readily perforated. It was also found that there were considerable differences in the alignment of the stamps on the various printing plates. As a solution to the expansion and contraction of the paper, Henry Archer prepared the Prince Consort Essay in 1851. This relief printed essay was engraved by Samuel William Reynolds, printed by Robert Edward Branston and promoted by Henry Archer. These essays had three main objectives:

- 1. To prove that relief printed stamps could be produced considerably less expensively than intaglio printed ones. This was a project of the Archer brothers, Charles and Henry.
- 2. Plates for relief printing were more regularly made than those for intaglio printing.

3. Printing on dry gummed paper avoided distortions when the dampened paper dried, ensuring a uniform size of the printed sheets.

The essays were produced in sheets of 36, three horizontal rows of 12, in sheets of 240 and in sheets of 252 (21 panes of 12) and printed in various colours brown, red, black and blue. The stamps are superficially very similar to the early line engraved stamps, except that the image of Queen Victoria has been replaced by that of Prince Albert. There are stars in the two top corners. All the photographs that I have seen have the letters FJ in the two bottom corners. They exist with and without the tablets POSTAGE and ONE PENNY at the top and bottom. They are usually found imperforate and more rarely with Archer's experimental perforations. Although never used for postage, they are listed with the line engraved stamps in the Gibbons Specialised Catalogue, Volume 1 -Queen Victoria, 12th. Edition, unfinished imperforate from £6500, \$16500, and finished (with postage and one penny) imperforate from £575, \$1500, perforate 16 from £1500, \$4000.

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### No More Free Parking

### **Club Approaches 1000**



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# Stamps honor crew that sank U-boat

Syd Cole, who 36 years ago helped sink a U-boat and then beat off German crew members trying to board his overloaded rubber dinghy, gets a series of commemorative stamps tomorrow.

In the action off Iceland, his captain, Flight Lieutenant David Hornell of Mimico, won a posthumous Victoria Cross.

At Canadian Forces Base Downsview, where Defence Minister Gilles Lamontagne will present the first Kiowa helicopters to the two air reserve squadrons, he'll also give Cole his aviation stamps.

One of them shows Hornell's white Canso flying-boat diving for a depth-charge attack on the submarine - and it's wrong! Eagle-eyed Cole, 57, a former policeman now with North York's traffic department, spotted it right away. After all he was there.

Cole, winner of the Distinguished Flying Medal for the action, said the stamp shows the U-boat off the starboard side of the aircraft. In fact it was off the port side.

Last surviving member of the Canso's crew of eight - he hasn't heard from another Wireless/air gunner, Joe Bodnoff of Ottawa, for years and believes he must have died - Cole spent 21 hours in the water off Iceland with his crewmates.

On Sunday June 24<sup>th</sup>, 2001 the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum PBY-5A Canso was dedicated to the memory of Flight Lieutenant David Hornell, VC.

Both flight engineers died in the dinghy and Hornell, blinded and unconscious, died in the rescue launch.

Cole of Ellerslie Ave. Said Hornell, who at 34 was much older than the rest of the crew, insisted on taking his turn in the water, clinging to the dinghy which was built for only five. The other had burst when it was inflated.

Hornell's Canso, whose depth charges straddled the U-boast perfectly, was riddled with flak from its deck guns. One engine fell off as Hornell dropped his charges and the entire starboard side of the aircraft was on fire.

### **Huge waves**

"About 20 percent of the time we were all in the water anyway because of the huge waves", Cole said.

He remembers the urge he had to push the others out of the way and the counterurge to let them go first in the tiny dinghy. Their 16 Royal Canadian Air Force squadron, based in Iceland but flying out of Wick, Scotland, had lost one Canso a day for a week to the aggressive U-boats.

Cole vividly remembers using a freshwater cylinder to beat off U-boat crew members trying frantically to board the dinghy. Periodically, the eight men rubbed each other's limbs to keep warm and restore circulation.

After seven or eight hours, they spotted a Canso five miles away and decided to fire off their two little signal flares. The second was their savior and the Canso came over and dropped smoke floats to mark their position.

#### Flying boat

On the Aldis lamp, the aircraft signalled: "Congratulations. Sub sunk. Help on way."

After two hours, its fuel low, the Canso departed. Two freezing hours later, a four-engined Sunderland flying boat turned up, but couldn't land on the mountainous waves.

The, another aircraft with a lifeboat attached soared overhead and dropped its precious cargo.

"It was bloody beautiful sight" said Cole. "It came down on six parachutes. But five collapsed and the sixth stayed on like a sail. Last we saw, it was headed for Hornell's Canso banks for a dive on U-Boat (Scott 846)



Greenland."

Another aircraft dropped spare dinghies, food and water, but it landed 100 yards downwind and the crew never saw the container again. At one point, there were seven aircraft overhead.

At last, after 21 dreadful hours, with two rough but reverent burials at sea, the rescue launch arrived and took them aboard.

When Lamontagne presents helicopters to 400 and 411 Squadrons tomorrow will be interested, of course.

But his memories will be back with 162 Squadron on that June day in 1944, when David Hornell won the highest decoration the Commonwealth can bestow and giave names to 442 David Hornell V.C. Wing, RCAF Association and David Hornell Public School.

Editor's Note: In researching this article I found the dedication of PBY-5A Canso as noted lower left. The article stated that at that time, in 2001, the only two remaining survivors of the Hornell incident were Graham Campbell, DFC, and Ed Matheson, DFC. 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# Stamp Collecting and the Internet: HAWAI'I POST

Every once in a while you come across something that either peaks your interest or completely knocks you off your feet. I certainly fell dead smack in the middle of those categories recently. Following our January meeting, I decided that I was going to write an article on the availability of stamp album pages from Internet sources (keeping with my *Stamp Collecting and the Internet* theme). In the middle of my search I found some free pages for stamps released by the Hawai'i Post.

Hold on... didn't Hawai'i stop issuing stamps 100 years ago in favour of the US Postal Service. Yes, but in May 1997 Hawai'i Post was established as a messenger and delivery service in Waikiki to pick up and deliver urgent mail. The Post operates under the exemption to the U.S. Private Express Statutes that allows urgent mail and is registered in the State until 2011. On June 13 2000, Hawai'i Post started issuing postage stamps for prepayment of services.

The issuance of stamps by an organization other than the USPS is perfectly legal. The stamps prepay a service that the Post provides. Many other local posts exist or have existed in the U.S.A. This is not the first nor will it be the last.

The denominations on the stamps the Hawai'i Post issues reflect the actual cost of the services they provide. The exemption to the U.S. Private Express Statutes that allows urgent mail requires a minimum of \$3 per delivery and only allows same day or overnight delivery. The \$3 minimum rate was set by law many years ago. Pick-up and delivery rates are very reasonable when compared to other express mail companies. By law, they can only deliver express mail and not regular mail. For example, the Post could issue a 37c stamp but it would be illegal for them to deliver a regular letter with it. Most of the stamps issued since 2000 have been a \$5 or \$8 rate. All stamps issued by Hawai'i Post have a Hawai'ian theme or are directly related to Hawai'i. Your input for future issues is welcomed.

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Waikiki is a bustling suburb of Honolulu. High-rise Hotels, Businesses & Condominiums compete for a view of the Pacific Ocean and Diamond Head. It's many diverse businesses, residences and hotels are all served by Hawai'i Post. Their office is not open to the public. All express mail is picked up and delivered. Future plans are for a walk-in office where express mail can be dropped off for delivery. Hawai'i Post picks up and delivers using four methods on foot, by bicycle, by moped and by minivan. A moped has been found to be the fastest and most versatile method for small packages and larger packages are moved by minivan. If you are planning to visit Waikiki soon, and would like to purchase stamps, send them an e-mail in advance of your arrival detailing the stamps you wish to purchase. They will then deliver them to your hotel when you arrive, at no extra charge.



#### SurfBoard Mail

A special service was added by Hawai'i Post on August 24 2002 called "Surfboard Mail". This consisted of a special cacheted cover with a \$3 surfing stamp and a special postmark. Only 500 covers were produced and carried by "Surfboard Mail". The surfer left Duke Kahanamoku Beach (in front of the Hilton Hawaiian Village) with a bag of mail at noon. Paddling his surfboard along the Pacific Ocean, the surfer arrived at the Outrigger on the Beach Hotel at about 12.25pm. Mailed covers were available for pick up at the Stamp Show in the Outrigger on the Beach Hotel on Saturday and Sunday August 24 & 25.

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
## SURFBOARD MAIL

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
# Fund Raising for ROYAL\*2004\* ROYALE
