Deutsches Reich 1889, The Crown and Eagle Issue

In 1889, a new series of definitive stamps appeared, the last in the series of so-called neoclassic issues. In philatelic circles, it has been known as the "Crown and Eagle" series.

The issue of these stamps is directly connected with the ascension to the throne of the German Kaiser Wilhelm II. In an imperial decree dated 6 December 1888, he altered the form of the German Eagle. Corresponding to the concepts of the young and impulsive Kaiser, the new form of the eagle shows a more aggressive form with wings widely outstretched. After this new form of the eagle had been introduced on coins, it was also presented on a new set of definitive stamps on October 1 1889. Two different formats were used, one for the lower values of 3 and 5 Pfennigs, and another for the higher values beginning with 10 Pfennigs (Figure 1). The stamps of the previous "PFENNIG" series remained valid for postage until January 31, 1891, so that for a period of 14 months mixed franking, containing stamps of both these issues, was possible. With the introduction of these stamps, the colors of the UPU were also introduced which meant that specific colors corresponded to specific types of mail. This was a big help to foreign postal officials in identifying correct postage rates.

After these stamps had been in use for more than a decade, they were finally replaced in 1900 by the "Germania" issue.



Stamps and Postal History of the German Marshall Islands

In various German colonies in the Pacific postal services had existed prior to German annexation, which had also issued stamps. Examples are Samoa, where stamps were produced by local entrepreneurs in 1877-1882 (Samoa Express stamps) and also in 1887-1900 (Palm issues). In German New Guinea the first services were those by the German Reichspost. In Micronesia, the Spanish operated a mail service out of Manila, touching on Guam as well as the Spanish garrisons on Yap and Pohnpei (Ponape).





Prior to the Spanish-American War of 1898 the Spanish administration in Micronesia used domestic stamps from the Spanish Philippines without overprinting (right), while the official Spanish correspondence went on Naval vessels without postage stamps. After the loss of the Philippines as a consequence of the Spanish-American War of 1898 Spain sold her Micronesian colonies to Germany. For the short period between February and November 1899 stamps were in use in the Spanish Marianas, which had been produced by overprinting Philippine stamp stock which had become obsolete.

The lack of standardized and reliable shipping services to the 'outside' world implied that it was of little use to create stamps for the German Marshall Islands. Most of the pre-German and early German was delivered by captains of vessels to Honolulu or Sydney and posted from there.

A post office opened on Jaluit in March 1889. The first stamps used were standard German Reich stamps of the Eagle issue of 1880, postmarked Jaluit. An example is example shown at left. In 1899 these "Vorläufer" issues were replaced by formal issues, which consisted of standard German stamp stock overprinted with "Marschall Inseln." In this the stamps were identical to issues produced by the German Post Service for the other German colonies in the Pacific and in Africa. These issues had been produced given the demand for 'colonial' stamps created by stamp collectors. Issued were the values of 3, 5, 10, 20, 25, and 50 Pfenning. Soon after a variant issue, using the correct spelling "Marshall Inseln" was also issued.

In 1901 the German government produced a uniform colonial issue featuring the Imperial Yacht Hohenzollern. Two designs were produced, a smaller one for the 3, 5, 10, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50 and 80 Pfennig values and an oblong one for the 1, 2, 3, and 5 Mark values. During the period post office was opened on Nauru. Just before the outbreak



of Wolrd War I the German post moved to produce these stamps on watermarked paper. Some of the values and postal stationery were produced for the Marshall Islands even though the colony had been lost early in the war.

Following the capture of the Marshall Islands by Japan and of Nauru by Australia in the early days of World War I, the German postal service ceased to function. The German stamp stock on Jaluit was Officially destroyed. Yet a number of stamps are known that are overprinted with the personal seals (chops) of Japanese Officers. These are philatelic oddities but were never used for mail.



On Nauru Australian troops captured German stamp stock, which was taken to occupied New Guinea and overprinted "G.R.I." (George Rex Imperator). These G.R.I. isues are rare and have been extensively forged, usually using fraudulent overprints on genuine stamp stock. In 1916 the British government issues standard British stamp stock overprinted 'Nauru' for use on the island





Dorothy Wilding (1893-1976) Photographer

Next year, 2004, marks the appearance of the "Wilding" definitive stamps of Canada. The first British definitive stamps of the reign of Queen Elizabeth issued in December 1952, were the "Wilding" definitives. The Wilding portrait of the Queen was a prominent feature of stamps in the earlier years of her reign. Other Wilding portraits of members of the Royal family also appeared on several different stamps of various Commonwealth countries

Dorothy Wilding was born on 10 January 1893, the ninth child of Richard Wilding and the fourth daughter with his second wife, Mary Marthe Edwards. She was brought up in Cheltenham Spa by her childless aunt and uncle, Fanny and Thomas Hayter. The ambitious young lady wanted to make her mark on the world. She purchased her first camera and tripod in 1909 from a shop in the Cheltenham Promenade, where there is still a camera shop. Very early on,

she formed an interest in the technique of Lighting.

Despite family objections she moved to London and began her photographic career as an

apprentice specializing as a retoucher for three leading London West End photographers: Walter Barnett, Richard Speight and Marion Neilson. By 1914 at age 21 she had saved enough money to open her first studio in George Street, Portman Square. In 1918 she moved to larger studios in Regent Street and then to Bond Street in 1924. After moving from George Street she began experimenting with artificial lighting.

During the 1920s and 1930s portrait photography in England enjoyed a golden era. Amongst the many photographers in London, Dorothy Wilding excelled as the most successful and most fashionable woman practitioner. Her many clients included the glitterati of the 30s, 40s and 50s. Wilding went on to become England's most successful portrait photographer and, despite having been associated with Mrs. Simpson and Edward VIII, she became the first woman to be granted "By Appointment" status to the royal family. In 1937 the year she was invited, as the first woman, to take the official accession and coronation photographs of George VI and Queen Elizabeth., she opened another studio in New York.







Wilding was not only a great photographer, but also a great lighting technician. She created her own individual style in which the important elements included lighting, simple art deco props and plain white backgrounds to produce authoritative elegant and geometric compositions. This accomplishment, when combined with her distinct artistic flair, produced some of the greatest photographic portraits of the last century. Her autobiography *In Pursuit of*

Perfection was published in 1958. Her surviving archives were presented to the National Portrait Gallery (London) by her sister Mrs. Susan Morton in 1976 and formed the basis of a major NPG retrospective exhibition and catalogue in 1991 with the same title, "The Pursuit of Perfection".

She married twice. In 1920, when 24, she married Walter Portham, a 49-year-old leather merchant. The marriage was in effect a father-daughter relationship. They were divorced in 1932, and Walter died of a heart attack during the Second World War. Her second marriage, in 1932, was to a long time friend, the interior decorator, painter and Mayfair architect, Thomas 'Rufus' Leighton Pearce. She had no children. She retired in 1958. By this time her style of portraiture had become unfashionable. In her later years she concentrated on interior decoration. At age 83 after a long illness she died on 9 February 1976. Her death was noted in the Deaths, In Memoriam column of the Daily Telegraph, but not a single obituary was published.

Jane Richards, in *The Independent Magazine*, 29 June 1991, writes: "Never a beauty, short and stocky, she wore horn rimmed glasses and a black beret, she seems to have used photography as a projection of her own female ideal". Tallulah Bankhead is said to have declared, "This is the woman who made my name in London with her beautiful photographs of me," to which Wilding replied, "And this is the woman who made my name with her beautiful head."

Wilding's portraits have been used on a number of British and Commonwealth stamps. The first Canadian ones were the pictures of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth on the 1939 Royal Visit stamp. The same photographs were used on the Newfoundland 1939 Royal Visit stamps. After the end of the war it was decided to issue stamps showing the King in civilian clothes rather than military uniform, and



Wilding portraits were used for the 1949 definitive series. I am not sure where the King's portrait on the 1948 Responsible Government stamp originated, but it looks very similar to the 1949 definitive series portrait facing left. The Royal Wedding stamp marking the wedding of the present Queen has a Wilding portrait. The first definitive stamps of the reign of Queen Elizabeth II, 1953, used a picture based on the Karsh photograph. These were replaced in 1954 with the Wilding definitives, which in turn were replaced in 1962 by the Cameo issue. Detailed descriptions of the earlier Canadian stamps can be found in Canada's Postage Stamps by Douglas and Mary Patrick. Copies of this are available in the Club Library and at the Spring Garden Road main library.





Recently the "Wilding" definitives have been reissued in Great Britain. A Wilding portrait of the Queen Mother was used on the issue to commemorate her 90th birthday and also the mourning stamps, 29d. and E rate respectively.

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Europa 2003 - Poster Art Jersey Post

Jersey Post Bulletin No 123, February 2003

The theme chosen for the 2003 Europa postage stamps by Post Europ, the governing body for Post Offices within Europe, is 'Poster Art'. Each member of the Postal Administration is free to interpret this theme as they wish and Jersey Post has chosen to feature tourism/travel posters which are in the possession of the Jersey Heritage Trust and held at the Jersey Museum. From the interesting collection they have in store, four posters were chosen which would suitably reduce down to stamp size and still be discernable.

During the first half of the 20th century or so, a number or posters were created to publicise Jersey as being the perfect holiday destination and the various ways in which a traveller could reach the Island. One particular poster also attempts to encourage a visit to Jersey by stating 'for health and climate' and one can't help but imagine a poorly young woman or man, perhaps lovesick, being packed off with a maiden aunt for a month to cure their ailments by travelling - good for the constitution, you know! These posters would have been displayed in railway and bus stations inviting people to sample the delights of the apparently always sunny Island. interesting to observe that although Jersey can still boast the beautiful clean beaches and the green scenery, today's Jersey Tourism Department are putting just as much emphasis on the Island's sophistication, excellent restaurants and 'eateries' and the various festivals held throughout the year. Since the early days of tourism, Jersey has enjoyed the kudos of being a popular destination for people seeking a week or two away from the daily grinds of home. Tourism in Jersey is still a very important industry although the Island has lost some of its appeal due to the advent of cheap, almost guaranteed sunshine holidays to the Canary and Balearic Islands, Spain and Greece for example.

As usual, Jersey Post has created four stamps for the Europa, two bearing the stylised logo. Two of the stamps feature poster artwork by Adrian Allinson (1890-1959). Apparently, Allinson was employed by British Railways to produce visual advertisements for their destinations. The 'Sunny Channel Island' lithograph dates from 1947 whilst the oil-on-board of Portelet Bay is from more than decade earlier in 1935. This type

of poster performed the same use as a travel brochure would do nowadays, principally to make a destination look so good that you cannot resist a visit.

The graphic representation of the Island by Lander dates from 1952 but, apart from the typical 50's dress and pose, the poster would not be out of place in today's world. The elements of eating or drinking alfresco, the superb seafood, sporting activities, love and romance and golden beaches are still used as tempters by current advertisers. Recent changes in Jersey have allowed couples to marry in all sorts of places outside churches and the registry office. Recent venues have included private clubs and, very romantic and 'in vogue' with the rich and famous at the moment, castles.

The oldest poster to be used is from 1910 and is the one which advocates the Island's constitutional benefits. Entitled 'Chemins de Fer de I'Ouest', the poster shows the geographical position of the Channel Islands in relationship to the coast of France and details the routes available from the London and South-Western Railway.

Another, very pretty, poster has been used on the First Day Cover envelope. This 1955 poster is the work of John Bainbridge and it was bought by the Jersey Museum at Christie's auction house in London in 1998. Entitled, 'Jersey in merri May and any time', it depicts a rather 'leafy' mermaid on the beach with some sporting equipment at her feet - sorry - tail, once again promoting the Island as sunny with golden beaches.

The Europa - Poster Art stamp issue was released on 11th March 2003 but the Bureau despatch date is not until 15th April when the Jersey Lighthouses II stamp issue will also be despatched. The Jersey Heritage Trust are continually staging exhibitions which look at various subjects and themes of Jersey history and are always well worth a visit.
