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Eldorado in Canada: Uranium

Ernest Rutherford (1871-1937) was an experimental physics professor at McGill University, Montreal (1898-1907), where he set up a nuclear sci-

ence world centre for research into the structure of the atom and radio-




activity. The stamp depicting a burst of energy contained in light (Sc. 534) commemorates Rutherford's achievements on the 100th anniversary of his birth. But Canada's nuclear industry did not take off until the 1930's.

Gilbert LaBine (1890-1977) was a prospector and mining promoter, who in 1926, with his brother Charles, started the Eldorado Gold Mine in Manitoba. When the mine petered out LaBine took his gains and with C.E. St. Paul headed north to explore around the Great Bear Lake, NWT area. Prospecting in areas of showings as described in 1900, they



discovered silver ore rich with pitchblende at Echo Bay (now Port Radium). The stamp shown here (Sc. 269) was released in September 1946 and shows the area where the deposit was found on Great Bear Lake.

The new Eldorado mine, which produced radium refined at Port Hope, Ontario, lasted until 1940 when it was forced to close because of a loss of European markets for radium. The potential for uranium at this time was unknown. By 1942, the war effort in the United States required a source of uranium and the mine was reopened. The Canadian Government took over control and secretly bought out the company in 1943. The mine was na-

tionalized and renamed in 1944. LaBine remained as president of the "Company" until 1947. The crown corporation held a monopoly on the prospecting and development of uranium until 1948.

The cover (previous page) from the Eldorado Mining and Refining Company (1944) Limited is franked with a wartime KGVI 4c (Scott 253) postmarked July 26, 1946 from Toronto. The 4c US rate was in effect until Oct 1946 when the rate was changed to 7c for a 1 oz. letter.

In the 1960's demand for weapons grade uranium waned and production then focused on fuel for nuclear reactors. The company became Eldorado Nuclear during this period and in 1988 merged with Saskatchewan Mining Development Corp. and later privatized to become Cameco Corporation, now the world's largest uranium producer.

Canada developed the world's first atomic reactor outside the United States at Chalk River in September 1945. The internationally recognized



the early 1950's. The stamp shown here (Scott 449) depicts the first CANDU reactor at Douglas Point, Ontario (built that year) and promotes the peaceful uses of atomic energy in 1966.

Canada is a world leader in atomic reactors for electrical power generation and a top uranium producer (over 1/3 of the world mine output). In 1980 Canada Post issued a stamp commemorating Canada's uranium resources. This stamp (Scott 865)

The letter (below), from David Harvey's collection, was sent by a British solder H.M. Drummond, presumably an officer, stationed at Halifax to his sister (in-law?) Frances Drummond at Errol, Scotland. The backstamp is dated at Halifax. Nova Scotia on March 18, 1852. The receiving stamp on the front appears to be March 31, 1852 at Errol. The letter describes the winter scene in the basin and gives an account of curling.



He compares his stay in Halifax only to Corfu for the amount of activity available and laments leaving.

stamp Oddities

Over the past several years NSSC member George Mackenzie has been sending self-addressed stamped covers to numerous Post Offices in the United States and Canada. In doing this, he has also requested that if the cancel on the stamps was not clear then would the Postmaster/mistress place a clear cancel to the left of the stamps.

Over time, he has sent out over 150 covers and has had excellent results from everyone, with the exception of Lincoln, Nebraska. Their cancel was really unclear but did not provide a good cancel to the left as requested. The Postmaster did advise George that if he wanted another cancel he would have to affix another 60c (US) as per an attached photocopy of regulations with a handwritten note (below). Not very philatelic friendly of them.

Since George already had a very nice cancelled cover from Lincoln, New Mexico, he didn't bother them again realizing that if he had sent another cover he would probably receive another unreadable cancel.

Text from regulation:

# 323 First-class postage

Philatelic cancellations may be applied to items submitted in person or by mail only when postage amounting to domestic First-Class letter rate has been affixed.

#### Handwritten addendum to above:

60c is the rate for Canada and the cancellation has been fulfilled. Please affix additional postage of 60c for an additional cancel.

#### Great Summer Reading from the Stamp Club Library! by Heather Mackenzie



Check out some of the great new books recently added to the Club's library collection and do some summer reading. Maybe you'll get an idea for an exhibit for Novapex 2005!

Here are some suggestions:

1. For post card collectors, (and Nova Scotia postal history buffs) we now have a complete set of the "Post Cards of Nova Scotia Counties" series by Ken MacDonald. Ken's meticulous research makes these books really a definitive work on this topic.

If post cards are your "thing" you may also be interested in The Canadian Picture Postcard Catalog (1992 ed.), by W. Gutzman.

2. If you want to venture into the online world of stamp collecting, but are not sure where to start, take a look at Linn's Guide to Stamp Collecting Software and Collecting on the Internet, by William F. Sharpe. You'll learn how to search cyber-



space for the perfect stamp!

3. Everyone loves a good auction, and you can look back at some great ones with our new collection of philatelic auction catalogues. Have a look at some of the world's most outstanding (and expensive!) philatelic material with this collection of catalogues from major auction houses including Spink, Christie's, Harmers and Robson Lowe. One notable sample from this group is Stamps and Covers from the Royal Philatelic Collection (Spink auctions, May 17, 2001).

4. We have several new titles dealing with aspects of early Canadian postal history, so if this is a topic dear to your heart, you may want to check out Upper and Lower Canada Steam-Boat Mail to the 1860's, by F. Stulberg or Canada Post Offices 1755-1895, by Frank Campbell. (To name but two!)

This is just a very brief sample of some of the new titles available, so stop by the club library at the June meeting and stock up for the summer! (Please shake out that beach sand before bringing them back in September!)
