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BISECTS - Canada and Britain

By definition a bisect or split stamp is a fragment of a postage stamp used to prepay an amount of postage proportionate to the relation the fragment bears to the whole stamp.

The use of bisects of Nova Scotia stamps was legal. In the JJ exhibit there is a cover mailed on 20 May 1857 at Parrsborough, and then carried by the small local packet across the Minas Ba-

sin to Windsor and then on to Halifax, all in one day. The Royal Mail Steamer, the Europa from Boston, called at Halifax and picked up the trans-Atlantic mail, arriving in Liverpool, England on 31 May. The rate to Britain was $7\frac{1}{2}$ pence, but as there were no stamps to make up this rate, it was permissible to bisect (diagonally) the 3 pence to make the correct amount.

When Nova Scotia joined confederation the stamps of Canada were used. The Canada Post Office Act of 1867 stated that "a mutilated stamp or a stamp cut in half is not recognisable in prepayment of postage". Henry Hechler produced several covers with bisects, however, a careful examination of these covers shows that in most cases the bisect was additional to the postage required and is, in fact, a label. This is illustrated on the 1894 Hechler cover to the USA (previous page - from the RPSC Hechler slide show). The rate was 3c. A careful examination of the cover shows that in addition to the two black 1/2c small queens and the yellow 1c small queen, there was another stamp below the bisected dark green 2c. The cover appears to have had the correct postage and the bisect is in addition to the postage. The stamp below the bisect was apparently removed to make it appear that the bisect was part of the postage.

In Great Britain the early use of bisects was not sanctioned, although some examples of the use of the bisect 2d blue in 1841 can be found. In late 1940 there was a shortage of 1d stamps on Guernsey during the German occupation and the diagonal bisection of 2d stamps was

authorised for local mail from 27 December 1940 until 22 February 1941. The cover (top) shows the use of a bisect of the 1940 2d Centenary of the Adhesive Stamp stamp used locally on Guernsey, 21 FE 41.

The last cover has a diagonally bisected 20p Machin used locally in Worthing. The cover was cancelled 2 JAN 1981, and there is also a slogan cancellation COLLECT BRITISH STAMPS WORLDS GREATEST HOBBY. The second class rate at that time was 10p. The cover appears to have passed undetected through the post.

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Every Cover Tells A Story

While searching interesting for covers for this column on the internet. I came across this one (right) selling on eBay for \$125.00 USD. that included a letter from one of the Brown's children. I thought that it might tell a bit a of a story so I



decided search the internet further to see if I could discover anything about the addressee, the ship or the company. Success on two fronts. The cover is a 5c blue (Sc. 91) KEVII- franked, UPU-rated cover sent from Fredericton N.B. to Rosario, Argentina. The stamp is cancelled with a faint duplex Fredericton N.B. Mr 5 1906. Routed through Montreal and England, the back-stamp shows Rosario de Santa Fe. Rosario - birthplace of Dr. Ernesto 'Che' Guevara (1928-1967), Marxist revolutionary and Cuban guerrilla leader - is the third largest city in Argentina after Buenos Aries and Cordoba.

Omar P. Brown was born in St. Martins, New Brunswick (near Saint John) about 1855 and, according to the shipping records available, was a ship master by at least age 23. He was sailing Troop family owned vessels as early as 1881.

The *Kate F. Troop* was a wooden barque of 1124 gross tonnage built by the Troop family around 1881 in Tynemouth, N.B. (now Tynemouth Creek near St. Martins) and registered at Saint John.

No record could be found in the on-line ship registry for the time period of the cover, so it is unknown when Brown might have taken over the *Kate F. Troop* or under what circumstances, accompanied by his wife, he took the ship to Argentina.

The accompanying letter is folded in the eBay ad but the Brown's daughter (presumed) speaks in the opening lines of writing to her parents weekly and trying to contain her writing to not incur more expense for the weight of the letter. She also mentions the weather and some Fredericton activity in late February 1906.

I could not find out who Messrs. Boroskey & Co. were - presumably a shipping agent in Rosario, Argentina. The postcard shown here is a view of the rubblework wharves at Port of Rosario (date unknown - 1920s maybe?).



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stamp Oddities

Some members of the NSSC create their own covers. Dave Cooper once created bisects with the Capex '78 stamp-on-stamp issues through the mail. Hugh Rathbun creates lovely cachets of Nova Scotian events.

Harriet Russell, a British illustrator, has taken this "art form" to new heights and published a book about it - Envelopes: A Puzzling Journey Through the Royal Mail (Random House, Nov. 2005). Over the years Russell has sent herself covers created in an elaborately decorated way to illustrate her address including puzzles, mazes, maps, anagrams, dot-to-dots, unique fonts and word-play, just to see if they would arrive. She writes in her preface that she is "sure that the patience of many a postman has been severely tested." She reports that the majority of the envelopes were delivered with a Royal Mail postmark to prove it. The book is available in Canada for \$23.95.


