#### **British Victorian Letter Cards**

The Post Office introduced prepaid Letter Cards on 11 February 1892. These were pale blue with a letterpress red 1d stamp, the same design as the 1d letterpress stamp on Post Office Postcards for overseas use. Although intended for inland use, it is clearly stated on the back that "if used for transmission abroad the additional postage should be supplied by means of adhesive stamps." The letter was written on the inside of the folded sheet, and the card was then sealed by using the gummed edges on the front. The cards were perforated for easy opening, following the instructions "To open the letter card, tear off the edge at the perforations." Two cards are shown, both used in 1892. The inland



card is from Brighton, office number 152, AU 8 92, to London. The other, to Bombay, which was mailed from Tunbridge Wells, office number 820, AU 5 92 has a 1½d jubilee stamp added to cover the postage,  $2\frac{1}{2}d$ .

Various designs of Private Letter Cards appeared shortly afterwards. These

cards were similar to the Post Office ones, but had no stamp. The budget letter card series were patented and printed by Langley & Sons, Euston Works, London, N.W.. The cards had an additional sheet stapled on the inside. Two examples are shown. The budget letter card with red printing on a cream card,



was used from Oxford, office number 603, MY 27 97, to London, MY 27 97, and has two ½d vermilion stamps added for postage. The Commemorative Budget Letter Card was produced for Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. It was printed in brown on a pale

buff card and has rounded corners. It has two 1d lilac stamps and a ½d vermilion stamp and was mailed from Glasgow OC 20 97, to Kingston, New Brunswick, Canada, via New York, arriving in Kingston OC 30 97.

Mention is made in Huggins (A.K. Huggins, British Postal Stationery, G.B.P.S., London, 1970) of a Stamped To Order letter card produced in 1887 with a 1d pink embossed stamp. The earliest used example is 11.7.87, which predates the Post Office issue by five years.



Mr. E. Benson, a native of New York, established Benson House in Lindsay, ON in 1875. The cover (above) is franked with a 3c Medallion (Scott 197), cancelled with a CDS and a slogan cancel, is dated



May 11, 1933. The proprietors of the day listed as Hyatt & Wellman. The Hotel was built in front of where the first Lindsay Post Office was established in 1834 in the house of William Culbert. Benson House, 24 Kent St W, Lindsay is now known as the Your Tavern, which, I am told, is quite popular with the local college folk. The postcard shows Kent Street and Benson House (near right) circa 1930.

### Stamp Oddities

The first airmail flight in Australia was flown from Melbourne to Sydney between July 16th to 18th, 1914, by French aviator Maurice Guillaux (1883-1917) who had come to Australia to do stunt shows.

A previous attempt was to be made in June 1914 by rival American aviator Arthur "Wizard" Stone - commemorative cards were published but the flight never materialized

The Australian Post Office would not take responsibility for the safe delivery of the mail. The mail weighed 40 lbs, approximately 2,500 items which included 1785 souvenir cards.



The post office provided this special cachet (illustrated) for articles carried by the plane. The cards sold for 1/- each with 1d required for postage. All mail was cancelled at Melbourne with the oval violet cachet Australia, Melbourne, 16th July 1914 via Aerial mail and back stamped at Sydney on July 18, 1914. Regular airmail service was not established until 1925 between Sydney and Melbourne.

At the time this was the longest airmail flight in the world made with seven refueling stops. It was more astonishing that the flight was made in mid winter (southern hemisphere) over mountainous terrain in unfamiliar country to the pilot using maps for ground travelers. After the commencement of the Great War in August 1914, Guillaux left Australia to join his country's air service. He was attached for a short time in 1917 to No.5 Squadron, Australian Flying Corps as an instructor, then stationed in England. He was killed in a crash while testing aircraft on May 22, 1917 at Villacouhlay, France.

Two stamps commemorating the 50th anniversary of this flight were issued in 1964.
