Forty Years Ago – 1966: A remarkable year in the life of British stamps

There were some very significant developments in British stamps in 1966.

It was, of course, the 900th Anniversary of the Battle of Hastings, the last invasion of the British Isles. This was duly marked with a series of commemorative stamps, 14 October, depicting scenes



from the Bayeux Tapestry. The first stamps of the year marked another 900th

Anniversary, that of Westminster Abbey, 28 February. In the meantime England had won the World Cup Football Championship, marked by the reissue of the 4d stamp, 18 August, with



"ENGLAND WIN-NERS" added. The Westminster Abbey stamps were the last ones to have the Wilding three-quarter facing portrait of the Queen; all the subsequent ones had an effigy profile of the Queen, adapted by

David Gentleman from the Mary Gillick coinage portrait. The smaller effigy size used on the 4d of the World Cup series appears to have become standard. The high value Abbey stamp, 2/6, had

the format of the high value Castle series, all the other special stamps being the size of two definitives stamps so that sheets of 120 stamps would fit into the books used by the Post Office counter staff.

That year stamps were also produced featuring British Birds, British Landscapes, British Technology as well as the first Christmas stamps. The Land-



scape set, 2 May, was the first issue that did not mark a special event or anniversary. The British Bird set, 8 August, had se-tenant blocks of four stamps, another first.

The next year, 1967, saw the introduction of the Machin definitives, as well as another format for special stamps that was first used on the British Paintings issue, 10 July. This format, known as the "Gentleman size" (David Gentleman), in the ratio 1:√2, had been used once previously on the 1948 Silver

Wedding £1 stamp. The Paintings and the 1967 Christmas stamps had deeper colours and were purely photographic reproductions.

What was the catalyst for all these developments? It was due to a new Government (elected in October, 1964) under the leader-

ship of Harold Wilson, whose Postmaster General, Anthony Wedgwood Benn (now usually referred to as Tony Benn) wished to bring his department more in line with other postal administrations. Among his suggestions was one to remove the Queen's head from stamps, presumably replacing it with Great Britain, which according to tradition established in 1840, has always been omitted from British stamps. The Queen did not agree. The David Gentleman design for a set of Rulers of Great Britain, including Oliver Cromwell, has the Queen's head replaced by the Royal Coat of Arms. After the election in 1966 Wedgwood Benn became Minister of Technology in the second Wilson government; he had, however, a lasting impact on the Post Office, including the choice and design of British stamps. The issues for this year, 2006, show a balance of commemorative stamps and pictorial stamps, including a series to mark the winners of the World Cup.

Cover Story

During World War II, special cancellations, called blackouts, where used by the post office, omitting point of mailing because of danger from German subs off the Atlantic coast and Japanese off the Pacific. These blackout hubs in six types were used in the seaport cities of Halifax, St. John and Quebec on the East Coast, and Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert on the West Coast. The stampless cover depicted below shows the type 5 blackout cancel - 2 rings, center heavy, outside light - dated APR 2 1945 and was sent to National Steel Car Cig. Club, Hamilton, Ont., Canada. This is a club that used to pay and send cigarettes to soldiers.

In addition to the blackout, the cover has a slogan cancellation (H-525 in Coutts' *Slogan Postmarks of Canada, 2002 ed.*) that reads: HELP THE RED CROSS with 2 filled crosses. Furthermore, this is a ship cover. Under the slogan cancel is a dark blue stamp that reads: FROM H.M.C. SHIP / EXAMINED BY DB/N79?, the end of the second line may contain another character but is indiscernible.

A Type 4 blackout cancel, shown below, has a double light ring with center ring broken in one to five places. This Vancouver cut square is canceled DEC 20 1943 on a KGVI war issue 1c with slogan B-716 (Coutts) - BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS and two Lorraine Crosses .



The Annual General Meeting was held on September 12 at the appointed hour. The meeting entailed discussion of the ensuing Novapex weekend, reports from the President and Membership Chair and the election of Officers. The Financial report was tabled until next meeting pending the Treasurer's return from a business trip. The presentation of the evening was the RPSC slide show "Waterfalls on Stamps" narrated by the President, which, by his own admission, was amusing for his pronunciation (and a good attempt at that) of the names of some falls. No auction was held, however the cover box was available for review and the draw netted \$39 for the club.

An executive meeting was held on August 29 and dealt with several issues including, Novapex, club finances, and space requirements for the Junior Club.

October's meeting, to be held on the 10th, will feature Karen Smith of Trivium Design, Halifax, designer of the Atlas of Canada stamp. An auction will follow.

It is with sadness that we announce the passing of John D. Hurst (NSSC #418) in Halifax on September 23, 2006, aged 74. Born in Halifax in 1932, he joined the Merchant Navy at age 16, quickly obtaining his Master's Papers. He graduated from Dalhousie Law School (1979), practiced Marine and Admiralty Law, and became a Chartered Arbitrator in 1995. He had worked on a number of different projects right up until time of his death. John was actively involved with Master Mariners, and the Navy League of Canada, for which he was awarded the Queen's Jubilee Medal.

John had been a member of the Nova Scotia Stamp Club since 1972, as well as a member of Friends of Philately, and frequently exhibited on Newfoundland's stamps and covers. In recent years he is remembered for involvement in club activities, especially for organizing security for many exhibitions and interpretation of club insurance requirements. Our condolences to his family.
