Yousuf Karsh 1908-2002

Yousuf Karsh was a prominent portrait photographer who made his home in Ottawa. He was born in Mardin, Armenia-in-Turkey in 1908 and came to Canada in 1924, where he lived with his uncle, photographer George Nakash, in Sherbrooke, Québec. His uncle realizing his potential as a photographer, arranged for him to apprentice with portrait photographer John Garo in Boston. After returning to Canada in 1932 he opened his studio in the Château Laurier, Ottawa. He was discovered by Prime Minister MacKenzie King, who introduced him to various visiting dignitaries. His 1941 portrait of Winston Churchill, taken in Ottawa, brought the photographer

was the basis for the 1952 low value definitive series, 1 - 5c, and another for the 1953 Coronation stamp, and the 1957 Royal Visit stamp. A Karsh portrait was used for the domestic rate definitive stamp with the Queen's portrait during the years 1988 (37c) to 2001 (47c). In the millennium series the



international fame, when it was used on the cover of Life magazine in December 1941.

The centenary of Karsh's birth was honoured by Canada Post with the issue of three stamps on 21

May (see page 2). The stamps show Karsh at work (52c), Karsh's portrait of Audrey Hepburn (96c), and the famous Churchill

portrait (\$1.60), that was also shown on the 8c 1965 stamp marking his death. One of his 1951 portraits of Princess Elizabeth, before she became Queen,

has been used extensively. In 2005 Sweden issued a domestic rate stamp with a Karsh portrait of D a g

Hammarskjöld, Nobel Laureate and former UN Secretary General, to honour the centenary of his birth. Karsh portraits of the Queen were used in 2002 on stamps marking the 50th anniversary of her accession to the throne. A 1984 portrait of the Queen is shown on the 45p British stamp and an early portrait of the Queen on the 45c stamp Australian stamp.

His last portraits were taken of Nelson Mandella and William Clinton. The Karsh Photographic Studio closed in 1992 and in 1997 Karsh left Ottawa, along with wife Estrellita, a medical researcher, for Boston, where he died in 2002.

COVER STORY... Toponomy is the study of place names. Many places in Nova Scotia have had more than one name over the years - starting with native names and then European names. Names were given by settlers to remember their homeland, by



bureaucrats to honour the elite, or as a way to exemplify a distinguishing attribute or industry of the area. The cover below is addressed to Newport. Brooklyn and Newport were both officially approved for the area in 1951 representing the Dominion Railway station (Brooklyn) and the Post Office (Newport). Brooklyn was confirmed as the community name under the NS Civic Addressing Project in 2005.

The Halifax Fire Insurance Association was founded in Halifax, Nova Scotia in 1809. It was acquired by Nationale-Nederlanden in 1959. In January 2002, the company was renamed ING Insurance Company of Canada and is currently known as ING Insurance, now the largest insurer in Canada.

Where in the World!? by Jeff Parks

Mayotte (Mahoré) is a part of the Comoro Islands group, located in the northern end of the Mozambique Channel between Madagascar and the coastal African countries of Mozambique and Tanzania. Mayotte, a 144 sq km volcanic island surrounded by a coral reef, is an overseas administration of



France but it is claimed by Comoros. The islands were ceded to France in 1843 and Mayotte was the only island that voted in 1974 (64%) and 1976 (99%) in favour of retaining its link with France. The matter has been discussed in the United Nations General Assembly ever since.

Mayotte was the first of the islands to fall under French influence and it became the French administrative and postal center in the archipelago. Between 1911 and 1975, Mayotte's



postal history is the same as the other Comoros: part of the Madagascar colony, then part of the Comoros Archipelago overseas territory. After the 1970s votes the postal history diverged again. Stamps of France were used from 1976 to December 1996.

Since January 1, 1997, Mayotte has been philatelicly autonomous and issues its own stamps. Postal operations are managed by an overseas subsidiary of La Poste.

The first stamps to arrive (1861) in Mayotte were the Imperial Eagle series, common to all French colonies (above). In the 1890s, French colonies began using the allegorical common design stamps with the country name printed on the bottom. Mayotte began using these in 1892 until 1912.



From 1912 to 1950, the island became part of the Madagascar colony. Old stamp stocks were overprinted with 5 and 10 centimes (left). By 1950, the

stamps of the Archipelago of the Comoros ("Archipel des Comores") were used in Mayotte and the other islands of the group.

After the independence vote, a shortage of stamps for Mayotte was due to the supply being stamps being held on Grande Comore. These stamps had been overprinted by the independent regime and no new stamps were available until the Metropolitan France stamps arrived. Since 1997 stamps of France are no longer valid.



Stamp Oddities

1956 marked the year of Italy's admission into the United Nations. To commemorate the event Poste Italiane issued a stamp depicting the world on a equidistant, azimuthal projection, presumably centered on Italy. This projection is neither conformal nor equal-area, but both directions and distances measured from the center are true. Two images were printed in the stamp design - one in blue green and one




in red. When the stamps were viewed through special glasses a 3 dimensional effect was evident. The glasses were supplied with an Italian ministerial bulletin that described the printing process. The stamps were printed in two denominations - 25 and 60 lire.



In 1925 two local stamps were issued by the Department (a state or province) of Caldas in Colombia. There is a local issued by Colombia with a map of northwest Colombia for the semiofficial service between Bogota and Cali in 1933.

The oldest map to appear on a stamp is the sixth century Medaba map. It is a mosaic which forms the floor of the chancel of the church in Madaba in what is now Jordan. This

sixth century map is pictured on stamps from Argentina, Israel and Jordan. Other early maps on stamps by Claudius Ptolemy and the Peutinger Table are not based on originals but on later reconstructions.
