Our Canadian Heritage on Stamps - John Cook

John Cook was born at Sanquhar, Scotland on 13 April 1805. Educated at the Universities of Glasgow and Edinburgh, he earned a Doctorate in Divinity and was ordained at Cardoss in December 1835. Cook then served as a minister in the Church of Scotland. In 1836 he came to Canada to serve his ministry at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Quebec, a post he kept for 47 years.

A deep thinker and reasoner, and a man of noble presence and distinguished appearance, Cook was well suited to St. Andrew's, a church with a large and enlightened congregation in a city that was a beehive of commerce and industry. His sermons were "models of literary form and texture (notable) for their beauty of diction, clearness of thought and lofty eloquence".

Cook had a great deal of business sense and was a "prince of committeeman". He inevitably gravitated to leadership positions of the Church. He was elected Moderator of the Church of Scotland in 1838 and again in 1844, when despite his best efforts, a schism divided the Canadian Church. He soon began work to form a reunion. All the diverse Presbyterian Churches in Canada finally united in 1875, proclaiming Cook as the founding Moderator of the General Assembly for all his hard work.

Education was one of Cook's foremost

concerns. In 1840 he was named principal *pro tempore* of a Presbyterian college at Kingston. He was involved with securing funding and a charter for the college under the name of Queens College (now Queens University), which he served as principal (1857-59) when no one else would take the job. Queens bestowed an honourary Doctor of Laws on him in 1880 following his term as

it's first chancellor (1877-79). He became principal of Morin College (1862) in Quebec, a post he kept until his death on 31 March 1892 at Quebec.

Mourned by Presbyterians as an educator, pastor, and national leader, Cook was praised by the francophone press as an "enemy of all fanaticism" and a man who had worked "to maintain between the two nationalities that spirit of good will which distinguishes the population of Quebec

City."



Canada Post issued this stamp of Dr. Cook on May 30, 1975. The stamp was a se-tenant pair with the other design depicting Rev. Dr. S.D. Chown of the United Church of Canada.

Pierides to renounce Christianity and his subsequent decapitation at the hands of the Turks in 1821. The initials Z L P stand for Zeno Pierides (1839 - 1911) a descendant of Pierakis. The Pierides family is still very prominent in Cyprus, and operate a Museum containing many early items of historic significance to that country.



RPSC Charts a New Course

At the Board of Directors meetings of The Royal Philatelic Society of Canada held in Quebec City May 16-18, 2008, the board named a four-member Management Team. The Team was charged with responsibility for board decisions and operation of RPSC business until ROYAL*2009*ROYALE scheduled for St. Catharines, Ontario June 12-14, 2009.

The team is comprised of J.J. Danielski, Michael Peach, George Pepall, and W. John Sheffield who are all members of the Board of Directors.

A management team approach was necessary because of vacancies on the executive and the need to recruit new people to hold office.

Recognizing its responsibilities went beyond recruitment and housekeeping matters, the Team determined it had to examine the whole organization and establish a plan for what the RPSC was to be and how it would better achieve its objectives.

The process, which was launched during the summer, had the Team craft a RPSC mission statement, a motto, and a statement of purpose. Setting goals, defining directions, and developing a strategic plan were also part the work.

Under study is The Canadian Philatelist, the society's journal; the annual convention, its purpose and objectives; and the ways the Society is managed, including its financing. The new plan for the Society will need to ensure, not only that the right things are being planned for, but that they will be performed the right way.

In a joint statement, the Team called what it is doing "a course correction" for the RPSC. They all agree that certain fundamentals must remain intact. The Society is dedicated to stamp collecting, and it is keen on helping new collectors get started. It is also important that established collectors have opportunities to communicate, to meet, and to discuss their hobby.

The statement included "It is evident that significant change is necessary to ensure the Society remains viable. Membership growth and development needs to be better managed and there needs to be a sustainable financial plan."

RPSC President Rick Penko is "happy" with the Management Team's early work, and "I am looking forward to more positive things in St. Catharines next year." He said "the Society needs this year of self-examination."

This month I continue a localization Brought to you by the letter.... This month I continue a look at letters as overprints.

K.P. an abbreviation for "Kaganitang Pampamahallan" meaning official business, is a WWII Japanese overprint on Philippine stamps for uses as occupation Official stamps.

L overprinted on stamps of Columbia indicates usage on mail carried by LANSA (Lineas Aeras Nacionales Sociedad Anonima).

M overprinted on stamps of Belgium identifies it as a military parcel post stamp issued during WWII.

NF "Nyasaland Force" abbreviated N.F. was overprinted on stamps of the Nyasaland Protectorate for use during British occupation of German East Africa during WWI.

O.B. overprinted on Philippine stamps starting in 1926 for "Official Business". Prior to 1926 the letters were added in manuscript, applied by typewriter or by use of a rubber stamp. Stamps of the USA from 1899-1901 and 1903-06 were also known to have this overprint.

P in a circle with a star and crescent were hand-stamped on Straits Settlement stamps to indicate use in Perak.

R plus a surcharge on stamps of the French colonies were for use on Reunion Island.

S overprinted on South Australia stamps, prior to the 1874 use of "OS" for general Official use, indicated "Sheriff".

T overprinted on Peruvian stamps indicates stamps for the province of Huacho. On stamps of Tasmania, the T indicates an Official stamp. In South Australia, prior to 1874, the T was placed on stamps used by the "Treasurer".

BRITISH DIAMOND LETTER MARKS


Before he died, Dave Cooper and I, a silent partner, were working on an article on Diamond Letter Marks on mail in the United Kingdom, for publication in the Great Britain Collectors Club Chronicle. By searching through some of his vast collection Dave was able to find 28 covers. These are, presumably, still somewhere in his collections. I have only been able to come up with 5. In order to complete this article I need some more covers or postcards, colour copies or scans, specifically,

Mail from overseas mail coming into the UK (I do not have any covers in this area)

- OHMS covers
- Paquebot covers with diamonds
- Airletters, or aerogrammes
- Triangular cancellations with diamond markings

An example is shown below. The diamonds were not cancellations, but were used when mail, either outbound or inbound, was counted. The marks can be either on the front or back.
