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Dumb Cancels: British Style

Dumb cancellations are defined as obliterations which bear no indication of the office of origin. An early example was the British Maltese Cross cancellation. During the two world wars these were applied to naval mail for security reasons to conceal the port of entry. In Canada during the Second World War the name was removed from the machine dater dies.

I recently found the cover shown addressed to well known London stamp dealer Oswald Marsh. It has four green King George V $\frac{1}{2}$ d stamps Downey heads cut out from postcards, to pay the inland postage, 2d / 3 oz in 1921. The right three stamps have a Universal machine London cancellation,



E.C. SEP 21 1921. The stamp on the left missed and has an eight bar dumb cancellation.

The dumb cancellations were used during the First World War to conceal the location of the Home Fleet, when not at one of the chief naval ports. ^{1,2} The cover addressed to another London stamp dealer H. Edgar Weston, with two green

Edward VII ½d stamps cut out from envelopes also has an eight bar dumb cancellation, but clearly indicates that it was passed by a censor during the war. Edgar Weston mailed packs of stamped covers to L i e u t e n a n t - Commander R.L. Clayton for posting back individually.



Another cover to

Howard Marsh (pg 2) with a red George V 1d Mackennal head scarlet stamp also has a dumb cancellation. Oswald Marsh's business was located at 1 Exeter Street during the Great War, and Howard was probably one of his relatives. This cover could have been mailed from one of the ships of the Home Fleet during the War when the letter inland rate was 1d.

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Dumb Cancels continued

How did this cancellation come to be applied at the London E.C. office in 1921? It is obviously tied to the two stamps on the left and the left stamp was not added later. This cancellation is one of several types of dumb



cancellations that were used on newspapers at the Newspaper Branch of the London Inland Section that had missed the regular cancellation, or on some printed matter³. This usage is not mentioned by Whitney² although Alcock and Holland¹ mention an early canceller at the Newspaper Branch with short thick bars.

The Newspaper Branch was at St. Martins-le-Grand, London E.C.. Was one of the eight barred dumb canceller still available for use at the London E.C. office in 1921, or did Oswald manage to obtain one?

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stamp Oddities

Postage stamps overprinted or perforated with the word "SPECIMEN" were at one time sent by each country to the Universal Postal Union for distribution to each member country for purposes of identification, for archives and for distribution to postmasters and thus maybe avoid the use of forgeries. Today these are more than often issued for marketing purposes.

Where English is not the common language, the words Muestra (Spanish), Monster (Dutch), Muster (German), ??????? (Russian), or Mihon (in Japanese) have been used instead of the word Specimen.Specimen stamps have also appeared with the text "CANCELLED, ANNULÉ

Specimen stamps were sent to postmasters as early as 1840 in Britain but without any marking. In 1847, the new one shilling stamps was marked with the word Specimen in order to prevent their postal use. The UPU members started receiving marked stamps form each other in 1879.



Normally issued in advance of the scheduled first day of issue, specimen stamps are normally sent to writers, editors and publishers for publicity purposes. Many countries also distribute them to those with standing orders of new issues,

both collectors and dealers.

This material does frequently end up in the market. They have no postal validity but have come to be distributed to dealers and used as promotional items for collectors. Since they are worth more than the original stamp, many over the years have been forged. Postal Stationary and revenues can also me found marked specimen.

Specimen stamps by themselves is a specialized field of stamp collecting. As a growing number of postal administrations issue specimen stamps they have today also became popular for stamp collecting by country and by topic.







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Invalid Stamps on Cover - Great Britain

While looking for material my exhibit on *Invalid Postage*, I found the cover shown. The 1972 cover is addressed to Harry Hayes, Batley, Yorkshire. At that time Harry was a part time dealer in Philatelic Literature, as well as a publisher. His business was sold in 1987 and now trades under the name of HH Sales, philatelic literature specialists and publishers.

The cover was mailed from Cricklewood, London N.W. on 11 December 1972, when basic the first class rate was 3p, and it has nominally stamps to the value of 3 pence. The only valid stamp, however, is the

Machin 1½p definitive stamp, the other three being invalid. Britain had changed to decimal currency on 15 February 1971 and the validity of stamps with values in the old currency expired on 29 February 1972, so the Wilding ½d stamp is invalid. Ireland had also changed to decimal currency in 1971, but the ½p Eire stamp, being from a foreign country, is invalid in Great Britain. Postage due stamps were only used for the collection of postage due, and could not be used for the prepayment of postage. The cover was forwarded at the second class rate, 2½p, and charged postage due. The actual postage due on this cover is 2p, double the deficiency 1d.

Literature on the Web

There are many fine sites on the web for finding information about stamps and philatelic items. One such site is the Canadian Postal Archives I housed on the Collections Canada website. The site has images and text of every stamp released in Canada from 1851 to 2009. and includes all former colonial issues. Each description contains a historical footnote, printer, designer, quantity, perforation, etc. and also provides information to other related documents held in the archive such as essays, proofs, covers - some of these with additional images. If you are a collector of Canadian stamps this site has all the basics you need to know except catalog number and value. You may even find a few surprises. Check out...


