

Nahariya Emergency Mail Service: 20 March to 21 May 1948 by Marty Zelenietz

Shortly after the United Nations 29 November 1947 vote to partition Palestine, civil war broke out between Arab irregulars and Jewish militias. Having announced a departure date of 15 May 1948, the British Mandatory authorities relinquished control of much of the countryside to the warring factions. Many Jewish settlements soon found themselves isolated. One such place was Nahariya, a




small coastal resort town in the Western Galilee founded by Jews who fled Germany in 1934.

The post office in Nahariya received notification on 14 March 1948 that as of the following day, all telephone, telegraph and postal services would be terminated. Nahariya's emergency governing authority, Mishmar Ha'am (National Guard), sent a van carrying mail south to Haifa on 16 March. It disappeared. Arab irregulars had blocked the road to Haifa near Acco. Nahariya was cut off by land.

On the 20th, a fisherman in a disabled motorboat carried a few letters to Haifa. Two

days later, a motor launch from the "Ogen" cooperative Haifa in ferried supplies Nahariya, and returned carrying the first clearly marked mail from Nahariya to Haifa. The emergency mail boat service was in business.

The Mishmar Ha'am ran the emergency mail service until 25 April. Carriage to Haifa was initially free



(although postage was required for onward forwarding), but on 4 April the Mishmar Ha'am began charging 10 mils for the service.

The Nahariya Municipal Council assumed control of the motor launch mail on 25

April, and issued its own imperforate postage stamps

inscribed "Emergency Post". Three days later, they issued the same stamps rouletted.

The Hagana the Jewish Self Defense Force, lifted the road blockade at Acco on 13 May. The Municipal Council released a final issue, inscribed "Emergency Mail", on 16 May. Normal overland mail delivery resumed on 21 May, ending the motor launch mail.

My one frame exhibit explores tumultuous two month period of the Nahariya emergency mail service. first examine the makeshift stencil cancellations of the Mishmar Ha'am and mail era, forwarding once the letters reached Haifa. then proceed to issues. rates cancellations of the Municipal Council era, a time which overlapped the end of the British Mandate and the formation of the State of Israel.



D.L.O. JUN 13 1916 WINNIPEG, MAN. - New Handstamp

This particular item is not proofed, thus until someone finds one, and checks it against known proofs and listings, no one will know of its existence. Many Canadian Dead Letter Office handstamps are found on foreign mail.

This particular cover originated in Belgium sent to Moline Canada Amerique. First destination to New York, N.Y. on May 13 1916. A postal employee wrote 'Try Montreal Que' From there is was directed to Moline, Man. MY 18 1916, held until JU 2 1916 and NOT.CALLED.FOR handstamp applied. Forwarded to Winnipeg Dead Letter Office on JUN 13 1916.

It is possible this item was returned on same day to Belgium in a Dead Letter Return envelope with no additional markings being placed on this item or forwarded to another Manitoba town per handstamp with Killer marking over it (indecipherable).

This DLO handstamp is so far the only known/reported of its type. Note the green ink used. A total of six different inks are used for Dead Letter Office handstamps: Green, Blue, Red, Violet, Purple and Black.



stamp oddities

Not that there is anything strange or odd about Royal weddings, however, this cover, below, was issued celebrating the announcement from Clarence House on 16th November 2010 of the engagement of H.R.H. Prince William of Wales and Miss Kate Middleton. This cover bears the 27p Prince William (Sc.# 1943b) stamp from the Queen Mother's 100th birthday miniature sheet (Aug. 4, 2000) and a 17p Machin (total 44p - 3p more than the current 1st Class rate of 41p. Am I missing something?), together with a Buckingham Palace handstamp on the day of the announcement. The "silken" fabric cover is produced by Benham Collectibles Limited of Folkestone, Kent, UK, a leading independent producer of First Day Covers. The Benham approach to covers is to produce "the most beautiful covers in the world" and having a cancellation connected with the event, as per the "Buck House" cancel, is part of the detail. This same design has been used many times by Benham for Royal events. These are, according to Stanley Gibbons, selling very fast at £6.95 (\$11 CAD). I would assume that on the occasion of their nuptials in 2011 the Royal Mail will issue a stamp of the pair as been done in the pas - the most recent for his uncle Prince Edward and Sophie Rys-Jones on June 15, 1999.

Our show is March 25-27 at our usual venue (West Edmonton Mall), and is a RPSC-accredited national level show. Our website is www.edmontonstampclub.com/, and contains further information about the show, as well as copies of the Exhibit forms and prospectus. We welcome exhibits, and attendees, from across the country and the United States.

Please consider exhibiting with us this year, or encouraging any other interested collectors to do so with us as well.

We like the stamps in Willie's book, the ones from Mexico;


The kind that comes from Africa—where red hot breezes blow;
