Anton Hechler: The Story of a 19th-century German immigrant* (Part 3) by Lorraine Rasmussen Introduction by Giles du Boulay


[Part 1 followed Anton from Darmstadt to New York, then Halifax and on to Clarence, Nova Scotia. Part 2 followed Anton through his United States mining adventures - then back to Halifax. Part 3 completes the serial. Some editorial license has been taken for the sake of space - Ed.]

A postcard from Wilhelm in 1894 reveals Anton's interest in philately. Wilhelm writes."... This postcard with reply attachment, which may soon cease, is destined for you collection..." Reprinting of the 1886 issue of postal stationery cards with the Bavarian Arms stamp did indeed cease in 1895.

Anton's sister Kathe had also proved to be a faithful correspondent over the years.

Wilhelm Hechler himself travelled extensively throughout Germany. Bavarian wrapper he sent to Anton in 1894 provides some evidence of that, as having purchased the wrapper in Bavaria he appears to have used it as a matter of convenience in Frankfurt. Consequently, the wrapper was franked with a 5Pf Reichspost stamp to pay the foreign printed matter rate whilst the 3Pf Bavarian imprint played no

part in the postage even though it was also cancelled.

The correspondence also includes a Württemberg postal stationery card form Wilhelm in 1894. On the back there is simply printed message "Die herzlichsten Glückwünsche sendet" without handwritten date or signature, to ensure the card was sent as printed matter. One can only speculate as to t the particular reason why Anton received special wishes for good luck at this time; perhaps, as we shall soon learn, he had given notice of yet another change of direction.

Anton returned in early March 1895 to Salt Lake City where his wife rejoined him. An avid stamp collector from youth, he now planned to become a stamp dealer. Henry began to sell hom stamps, encouraged him and suggested that he have letterheads printed "Utah Stamp Company, A.F. Hechler, Mgr." Since no such letterheads survive, Anton may not have heeded this advice. The only concrete evidence that he actually became a samp delaer is the extant remnant of a sign, probably placed in the window of his home, on which are firmly stuck the number of stamps of the world flanked by the words "SOLD & BOUGHT" in bold black lettering.

Restless as ever, Anton returned to mining late in 1895. Letters from December 1895 to 1897 were addressed to him first in Mercur then Silver City, both in Utah, and both now virtual mining "ghost towns". Late in 1897, Anton broke his leg in an accident in Silver City and was hospitalized for a time. He returned to Salt Lake City. His brothers Henry and Wilhelm and his sister Kathe, as always, kept in regular touch.

Anton clearly could not stay in one place long, for in the summer of 1898 he and his wife returned to Silver City, In

1899, Henry sent him two special pictorial covers promoting the forthcoming Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition.

Anton and his wife saw in the new century in Silver City. He must have delighted to receive the splendid card below from Wilhelm celebrating the dawning century full of hope and

promise for the future.

The new century did indeed bring new status fdor Anton, now aged 43. He sent his brother Whilhelm a copy of a local newspaper in which it was reported that he had become (Honorary) Chairman of the Board of County Commisioners. Whilhelm sent a postcard of congratulations form Frankfurt on which he arranged the stamos with philatelic care *[not illustrated]*. Henr, in Halifax, promptly bestowed the title "Honorable" on Anton and addressed him by that title on all future correspondence.

Anton's newfound position and undoubted cintement at having at last become established was sadly all too soon to be thrown into turmoil. In Spetember 1903 his wife suddenly died.

A new city with an alluring name beckoned - in the late winter of 1904 he moved, for what would prove to be his last time, to Eureka, Utah. This was the financial centre of the Tintic Mining District, whicj by 1899 had become tone of the top mining areas in Utah. In 1869 it had developed form a camp to a settlement, then into a town, and was incorporated as a city in 1892. In 1979 it entered the National Register of Historic Places.

Sometimne in the perios running up to Christmas 1906, Anton remarried and had a son to whom Wilhelm became godfather. Anton's bride was 21 years his junior and bore him another son in 1907.

Henry wrote ...to his "Honorable" brother on 20 July 1908. It ...appears to be the last letter received by Anton, a pioneer in his own right, from any of his siblings. It is not known whether Anton answered it.

Sadly, on 12 August 1908, after years of searching for a rich lode of silver, Anton found death instead, at the bottom of the mineshaft down which he had fallen.

He now rests in his grave in Salt Lake City between his two wives, The tombstone is still there today, clearly engraved, although with his year of birth given incorrectly, after the passing of one hundred years.

COVER STORY: BENEATH THE POSTMARK



Occasionally beneath or beyond the postmark there is an interesting story to be told. The following, I believe, is a good example. An entire, dates Nov. 13th 1806, from Auchinleck (near Kilmarnock) in Ayrshire to Edinburgh, shows a KILMARNOCK circular name stamp (Fig 1 0 below). It is a letter of sympathy written by Alexander Boswell to William Forbes on the death of his father Sir William Forbes , a well known Edinburgh banker (Fig 2 - right).

Alexander Boswell was born in 1785, the eldest son of James Boswell, the biographer of Dr, Johnson. He was a Member of Parliament for the County of Ayr and in 1821 received a knighthood. He was a devotee of Robert Burns and was responsible for the erection of several monuments to the poet's memory. Boswell produced two volumes of poems and songs which were highly popular in his own day.

He wrote many articles to the newspapers which were frequently written in a sarcastic vain. One such article to the *Glasgow Sentinel*, was written anonymously regarding Mr. Stuart who confronted the proprietor of the newspaper





demanding the name of the author. He was informed it was Alexander Boswell and thereupon Boswell was challenged to a duel.

The duel took place a few miles north of Edinburgh at the Auchertool in the County of Fife. Facing each other at a distance of twelve paces they were called upon to fire. Boswell was struck in the shoulder, the ball deflecting to the spine. Doctors were sent for from Edinburgh, but Boswell died the following day, Wednesday, March 26th, 1822. Surely a tragic end to a notable live. Mr. Stuart immediately fled England to escape prosecution. Later Mr. Brothwick of the *Glasgow Sentinel* was put on trial for revealing Boswell's name.

As a footnote, it might be added that one of Boswell's descendants was General Auchinleck of Second World War fame, who commanded the Allied Forces in North Africa until he was replaced by General Montgomery. Sometimes 'Beneath the Postmark' can, I think, reveal an interesting story.

Edmonton Stamp Club Spring National Show March 2011

The Edmonton Stamp Club's Spring National Stamp Show will be held March 25-27 at West Edmonton Mall, and is a RPSC-accredited national level show. An open invitation has been sent to anyone who has previously exhibited at a regional or local show, and has received at least a silver medal in open competition, to exhibit at a national show. Exhibit applications will be accepted up to March 1, 2011.

Please note: The multi-frame Grand Award from the show will be eligible for entrance in the summer APS annual Champion of Champions competition; the single-frame Grand Award will be eligible for entry to the AAPE One-Frame Champion of Champions competition (providing there are at least five single-frame competitive exhibits); and the Youth Grand will be eligible for entry to the APS Youth Champion of Champions competition (providing there are at least three competitive youth exhibits).

Canada Post Rates Going Up

It probably comes as no surprise that Canada Post is putting the rates up for mail delivery as of January 17, 2011. The new rates are as follows:

Domestic Standard - \$0.59 up to 30g Domestic Standard - \$1.03 30 to 50g

USA Standard - \$1.03 up to 30g USA Standard - \$1.25 30 to 50g

International Std. - \$1.75 up to 30g International Std. - \$2.50 30 to 50g

The non-standard rates for Lettermail and Letter-post, up to, and over, 100g, have also been revised. Of note is the parity of the Domestic and USA rates eliminating the need for a separate Domestic rate stamp for 30-50g. Current postal rates can be found at canadapost.ca/rates
