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Se-Tenant Stamp Designs - Quite a Pane! Part 1 by Jeff Parks

The first official se-tenant stamps in Canada was a 1954 beaver booklet pane with five stamps and an advertising label. Technically, any two or more stamps joined together are se-tenant, but what the term really refers to is stamps of differing designs. One stamp with an overprint may be joined to a stamp without and be referred to as se-tenant with a no overprint error. The dictionary defines it thus (n.) a block of commemorative stamps printed together on the same sheet but differing in design, color, value, or overprint.

On March 7, 1957, the Post Office issued the first se-tenant stamps in multiple designs. The recreation sports stamps (Sc 365-368) featured images of fishing, swimming, hunting and skiing. When you look at just the stamps it is hard to fathom the arrangement possibilities for the pane or sheet. The Post Office must have had the same dilemma and this series became highly collectable for the possible combinations

the layout of the upper left pane where the number indicates the stamp design: 1- fishing, 2- swimming, 3- hunting, 4- skiing. As you can see the layout is a recurring cycle of blocks (1-2/3-4) as shown above on both sides of the pane with two vertical centre strips of 1-2-3-4 down the middle (shaded). The very centre of the pane has a 1-2 vertical combination. The lower left pane is exactly the same. The right side panes however, had one small difference. Instead of the 1-2 vertical pair in the centre of the pane the upper and lower right panes have a 3-4 vertical pair. Thus, all of the stamps are matched in equal number across a left and right pane. As

I mentioned, this lead to some interesting combinations to collect -10 blocks of 4 arrangements on the pane shown alone, plus two se-tenant pairs each of 1 and 4 and many other combos of strips and pairs.

The next se-tenant stamps, the Japan Expo '70 issue (Sc 508-11), have a 50 pane configuration with variations on the previous description. Using the visual (right) the left side of the pane is a 1-3/2-4 block, the right side of the pane is

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configured opposite (3-1/4-2) and the centre strips is 1-2-3-4 from the top or in reverse on the bottom. The two remaining centre

two remaining centre positions are both assigned design #1 - the Expo '67 and '70 logos. Again, this lends to many collecting combinations including two horizontal strips of three of the #3 and #4 design and a vertical pair of #1. In total, there are 19 combinations of blocks of four stamps on this pane.

This pane configuration is also used in later se-tenant blocks of four

including the four vessels sets (coastal, inland, sailing and ice issued from 1975-1978 and the 1981 Canadian feminists (Sc 879-882) issue, except the centre vertical strip uses repeated design 1-2-3-4-1-2-3-4-1-2.

The variation on a theme continues with the two 1974 Olympic keeping fit series (Sc 629-632 & 644-647 (shown)). This pane configuration has elements of the last two described. In this set-up a strip of four Canada unique designs can be found in both the

horizontal and vertical as a well as several block of four combinations. You will note (middle right) that there are no setenant pairs or strips of the same designs as discussed earlier, although it is possible to get two same designs from a block in row combinations 2/3, 4/5, 6/7 or 8/9.

pane lends more to maintaining the block setup and does not present any full strips - the closest is the shaded horizontal strip of five designs shown. The diagram (bottom right) shows that six standard blocks in the 1-2/3-



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6 block layout only lends to a two over three unique presentation and nowhere on the pane does a three over two se-tenant block give six unique designs.

This has been a small look at some of the early se-tenant stamp layouts. In part two of this article I will review the grand scheme of the 1970 Christmas pane of 5c and 6c stamps, look at some smaller panes, discuss more recent pane configurations that include tabs (e.g. Industrial design), and finally a short study of the modern panes that defy designs of the past and lend more to a philatelist's taste and pocketbook.



The local stamps of Brunswick, in what is now Germany, in 1865 showed a white horse and crown. Some humourist of the day thought that he could

improve on the design and issued an amusing fake with the horse converted into a circus steed with a lady rider jumping through a hoop. Occasionally examples of the work of the anonymous philatelic humourist turn up in old collections and are

much sought after by collectors o f "Oddities". I couldn't find an image of one to show you.

The 1936 ANZAC memorial stamp of New Zealand was supposed to show a



soldier on the heights overlooking Anzac Cove - but many critics claim that the scene behind the soldier is Karaka Bay in Wellington.

When Hungary went through an inflationary period in 1946 it issued a set of stamps whose total value was 661 x 10^{15} pengo. The lowest value of the set was on trillion pengo and the highest values was 500,000 trillion pengo. After this period a new currency was introduced - 1 Forint = 100 Filler.

Now that the 100th anniversary of Canada's navy is passed, I thought I would pass on this following supplementary piece on Canada's first official naval vessel - the flagship HMCS Niobe. From the Halifax Morning Chronicle...



Only July 8 1911 while at Ouebec, orders were received to sail for set Yarmouth, NS attend Old to

to celebrate her founding. Niobe arrived in Yarmouth on the evening of the 23rd and participated in the festivities during the week. On Saturday the 30th at 5 pm she weighed anchor and left Yarmouth to visit other ports along the coast. The weather was clear at the time of departure with only a slight mist.

During the night of July 30-31 at 12:30 am the pride of the newly formed Canadian Navy came to a crashing halt. Our flagship, the Niobe, had run aground in a rocky ledge nine miles form Cape Sable Island, between Yarmouth and Shelburne. At the time of the grounding, Niobe was in dense fog and using admiralty charts of the Cape Sable waters dated 1855. She was 4.7 mile off course.

On impact the water tight doors were immediately closed and the engine room filled to a depth of ten feet, taking her down by the stern. A hole 25 feet by 10 feet had been opened up in the plates abd had the inner hull been damaged, she would have sunk like a rock.

At 12:30 the first COO message was broadcast. After two hours niobe refloated herself abd all the anchors were promptly lowered as so not to drift ashore. Soon after dawn she was towed by tugboats to Clarks Harbour for the damage to be assessed. Tugs and steamers from Halifax to Yarmouth and as far away as Saint John answered the call. All having the ability to assist in pumping. A drop of one inch meant a discharge of forty-five tons of water. Even the large 22 ton guns were removed to make he more stable.

First Day of New Rate: Cover with G.B. Bisect

The second class rate in Great Britain had increased on 26 January 1981 to 11¹/₂p/60g. The cover shown was used locally on the first day of the new rate, being mailed from Hastings, East Sussex, to adjacent St. Leonards on Sea. The cover has a 10p and a 1p stamp, together with a bisected 1p, to make up the 11¹/₂p postage. Bisects are not permitted in Britain, and it is doubtful that ¹/₂p stamps were not available, as written on the cover. It was not charged postage due, although it has been hand cancelled.

It is probably a philatelic cover.



Exhibiting, Articles and Presentations

Many of us are active in preparing exhibits on topics of interest in our collections and by doing this have become quite knowledgeable on this particular topic. Not experienced with a scanner, and scanning pictures to make a jpeg image? Many club members would be more than willing to help you.

Now that you have started scanning and preparing jpeg images, why not carry on with more images? It is a simple step now to make a slide show from your exhibit. You do not even need to know how to prepare a power point presentation. The images in any file can be used for a presentation. On a PC go to the start button, then my pictures on the right, then view as slide show. The file can readily be changed. The club has a projector, which can be used for trials.

Why not try and share you knowledge? The Editor would be delighted to have something for The Nova Scotia Post and the Club is always looking for items for the monthly meetings.

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Niobe continued...

The British cruiser Cornwall was dispatched to assist with the towing of Niobe back to the port of Halifax. Arriving at Clarks Harbour ion August 6th she also ran aground at about 1:00 am, but she was pulled off without much difficulty. Cornwall had struck an uncharted rock two miles form where Niobe was lying. She was also damaged and took aboard a considerable amount of water but this did not affect the towing job ahead of her.

Slow progress was made with the towing with an average speed of eight knots. Niobe did not use her engines so that the steam could be concentrated to keep her pumps working. It was so foggy the those aboard Cornwall could not see Niobe at the end of the tow rope.

The Cornwall was dispatched to Bermuda for repairs, while on September 1 Niobe went into drydock at Halifax for repairs that came to over \$400,000. The repair work was not completed until December 1912.

From the Niobe grounding came the first court-martials in the brief history of His majesty's Canadian Navy.

In 1920 Niobe was sold for \$40,175 and scrapped.
