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
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One Hundred Years Ago by Michael Peach


King George V, the philatelist King, had become King of the United Kingdom, and the British Dominions and Emperor of India, on the death of his father, King Edward VII, on 6 May 1910. The coronation was held in Westminster Abbey on 22



Coronation Issue of Stanlev Gibbons' Stamp Monthly reprinted as part of London 2010. This is now Gibbons Stamp Monthly. Inflation has increased the price from 4d (currently less 3¢) than to £3.50 (\$5.60). Physically the magazine has changed vastly from a smaller size, 180 x 258 mm, 32 page black and white magazine to a 146 page full colour one, size A4, 210 x 297 mm..

In contrast to the present Monthly, the advertisements were all from Stanley Gibbons, then at 311 Strand, London, and now a bit further down The Strand at 399. The adverts included accessories, albums, a selection of literature, as well as some stamps. An ivory pocket rule,

3" long or 75 mm, even metric measures were in use then, was for sale at 3/6 (three shillings and sixpence, 42d, currently about 28ϕ). This, being ivory, could now only





There were no stamps issued to mark the Coronation. The first definitive stamps of the reign were issued on Coronation day, the green ½d and the red 1d Downey head issue, with a three quarter profile of the King's head. These stamps were not favourablycontinued page 2

received by the public at large, and the editorial emphasizes this. The editor was well known philatelist Major E.B.



Evans, author of *The Mulready Envelope* and other works. There were no higher values produced using this design, which was replaced by the Mackennal head issues with the full profile of the King's head that had been used for coinage

Many of the articles were serialized. There is Chapter XII of Postage Stamps in the Making, Lithography and Kindred Processes, by Fred. J. Melville. The issue included information about world wide philately, The Cape "Woodblocks" of 1861, Chapter XX of The Stamps of Paraguay – the 1904 Issues, The Stamps of Brazil, and Australasian Philately Today. Some of the topics have not changed, such as Philatelic Society News, New Issues, including illustrations, and Discoveries, Reviews, as well Topical Reviews. If

New DLO Handstamp by Gary W. Steele

Collectors tend to gravitate towards various stamp and postal history

collections for a variety of reasons. I like Dead Letter Office covers because they tend to have a good story on almost all of them. Also, it is still a subject in the maturing stage even though they can be over 100 years old; there are still new items to find

Last year I obtained my first Winnipeg double circle #2. Note this is not a Barrel handstamp, as Barrels are known for the 1950's style handstamps using a device called a 'Barrel Assembly' with five different wheels. See Robert Smith's book 'Canada's Barrel Postmarks'.

The #2 and #4 double circle handstamps were proofed on December 4 1924 and November 7 1924 respectively. These appear to be a rubber handstamp as the inside circles are usually irregular. However, until the actual hammer device is found this is not concrete. It did not occur to me that a #1 and #3 might exist as none have been reported and only two of the #2 hammers have thus far surfaced.

Always surprised by new postal history material popping up, I came across this handstamp with a '1' imprinted on it. The upper letters are sans-serif, lower letters are serif. All letters are mixed with only D.L.O. being in caps, as is normal for the acronym of Dead Letter Office.

The cover originated in Winnipeg, Man. Aug 7 1929 paying the 3 cent 1st class letter rate to Ocean Grove, N.J. PO machine imprint Aug 10 1929 with the address crossed out and '201 E24 W N.Y. -c' written in. Held over for two months the cover was





then returned to the Madison SO PO Oct 8 1929, leaving Oct 9 1929 for delivery to the New York Dead Letter Office. There it was then opened and delayed again with the only N.Y. DLO handstamp dated Nov 14 1929, forwarded to the Dead Winnipeg Office. Letter received on Nov 19 1929

No additional information about the addressee or handstamps is shown, as this would have been placed on the Dead Letter Office Return envelope (Ambulance cover).

Nova Scotians Prominent at Royal*2011*Royale by J.A. (Jack) Forbes Jr.

Nova Scotians were recognized in several instances at the recent convention of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, held in Dorval, Quebec, and sponsored by the Lakeshore Stamp Club.

At the Awards Banquet, our Dr. Michael Peach became a Fellow of the Society, and signed the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists. This was in recognition of the many contributions Michael has made to the world of philately, including judging, exhibiting, publishing articles, local administration and serving on the Board of the Society.

During the Annual General Meeting, Rod McLennan of Truro, a long time member of the Nova Scotia Stamp Club was presented with an Honourary Life Membership in the Society accompanied by a medallion to identify this accomplishment. This award recognizes 50 years of continuous membership in the RPSC. At the same time, Marilyn Melanson, our local representative on the Board of the Society, accepted an Honourary Life Membership on behalf of Professor James Gray of Ward's Mountain, a member of the Valley Stamp Club.

It was pointed out at this session that, had death not intervened, two other prominent past members of our club would also have qualified for Honourary Life Memberships this year – Dr. Henry Hicks and Dr. J. J. MacDonald.

A further Nova Scotian connection arose when a previous clerical error was corrected, and Donald Climo received his Honourary Life Membership, one year late. Donald was born in Halifax, and his grandfather had operated a photo studio on Barrington Street for some 50 years.

The Stamp Beetle by Michael Peach

The Stamp Beetle was created in 1997 to mark the 50th anniversary of the Wolfsburg Philatelic Association. A total of 50,350 stamps were glued all over the old VW beetle.

Many collectors donated stamps, with stamps coming from all over the world. Since its creation it has been seen at stamp exhibitions across Germany and neighbouring countries. It has now come home to rest in the Volkswagen Automuseum in Wolfsburg, Germany, on permanent loan from the Wolfsburg Philatelic Society.

stamp oddities

Dazzle Paint: Dressing Ships up for War

In 1917, the German Navy declared unrestricted warfare using *Unterseeboots* (U-boats), and the allies had to come up with ways to deal with this menace.

The British consulted noted naturalists and painters of the day

to develop paint schemes, and one of the very first efforts were to paint ships in zebra stripes. In a herd of zebras, predators find it hard to single out one zebra due to the confusing mingling of stripes in a herb. This was



attempted with ships with the idea that a convoy of ships painted in stripes would make it hard to for submarines to pick out one target - any way of making it harder for submarines to judge speed, direction, or size lessened the chances of





successful attack. This form of camouflage was called disruptive camouflage. A herd of zebras is called a "dazzle", hence the origin of the term applied to camouflaging ships. The British HMS Argus (top left) saw service in both World Wars. The SS (RMS) Empress of Russia was originally built for Canadian Pacific Steamships but was commissioned by the Admiralty in both wars.
