Latest Reported Date

A rare handstamp that I have been looking sometime for is the on the back of item shown below. Although it does not stand out initially like my Ottawa oval handstamp on the cover to Gambia in the December newsletter, once you know what you are looking at, it does take on some significance. This item is also pictured on Brian Plain's DLO book cover.

There are two 21mm split circle handstamps, one with dots between the words 'DEAD.LETTER.OFFICE' and one without dots 'DEAD LETTER OFFICE'. It is listed as DLOS-1 and is the Latest Reported Date (LRD). The side arcs are 2.5mm wide and all letters as usual are sans-serif and capitalized.

Originally mailed from Wingham, Ont. AP 17 1876, a fancy business cover to Goderich Ont. un-paid as assumed to be Free On Her Majesties' Service, RETURNED – FOR / POSTAGE and RETURNED – FOR / DEFICIENT POSTAGE imprinted with a large '9', sent to the Ottawa Dead Letter Office AP 15 1876 (inset), postage received and franked with 3 x 3 cent Small Queens, received in Goderich on AP 18 1876.





Canada's Priciest Stamp

Canada's most valuable stamp is not the famed "12d Black" - but the innocuous looking 2¢ green stamp shown here.

Two of the 3 known examples will be auctioned in 2014. One was sold Feb 22, 2014 for \$C546,000 by Brighams in Toronto.

The firm is owned by Ron Brigham, the seller of this 2¢ stamp, and is part of his extensive and valuable Canada stamp collection being sold this year.

Charles Verge, the Auction CEO told me after the sale - "The stamp was hammered at \$C546,000 with buyers premium. Taxes have not been established yet".

That appears to be a little higher than the invoice price of the 1851 "12d Black" MUH example sold in 2011 for \$US489,000, by Spink/Shreve in New York.

So for the time being, I think we can say this 2¢ green Large Queen holds the record price for any Canadian philatelic item.

At the time, I typed that was a bargain price for a pristine, verified MUH 12¢ example,

with massive margins like that, and I concluded my auction report with -

"In my view it was a bargain, and if I had the money I'd have bought it in a heartbeat. Someone will do VERY nicely out of this next time it is sold."

Someone clearly agreed - that stamp is now offered for 50% more than that 2011 Auction price, at about \$U\$750,000.

The 2¢ Large Queen on laid paper was printed in 1868, but not first discovered by Philately until 1925, and so far only three have been found, all used. Many more could exist, as at least one sheet must have been printed, and probably many sheets.

Other examples may lie unrecognised in stamp collections. Or circuit books!

The basic stamp is fairly common, and is printed on wove fibre paper, the type of paper used for most stamps in this period.

A small printing was done on the "horizontally laid paper" meant for postal stationary, and these are the scarce ones.

Until last year only 2 copies were recorded. Then a third example was bought from an American Philatelic Society sales book, for less than \$5.

Sales or Circuit Books are where owners place an asking price on their surplus stamps, and the books are passed or mailed around within clubs etc.

That new find has a 2013 Vincent Greene Expert Committee Certificate as genuine in all respects.

It has small defects, as did the Brigham example, and bears a very pretty "March 17, 1870 Hamilton C W" (Canada West) SON cancel.

This new example will be offered for sale at auction by Gary Lyon in Canada in October 2014.

It has noticeably better perfs, centreing and cancel than the Brigham example, and has a current Cert, so I'd guess it will eclipse the realisaton of that example.

The Greene Certificate working papers for this stamp runs to TEN detailed pages.tinyurl.com/Green2c

This is only the third known copy of this stamp, and the first copy seen since the two other copies were expertised in 1935 by the Royal Philatelic Society, London.

Announcing The Nova Scotia Stamp Club Scavenger Hunt

Last year the NSSC held a very successful Scavenger Hunt with a large number of members participating. The stamps found were quite varied and came from all over the world. The competition was very close until Carmichael Wallace was awarded the win with a display chocked full of bonus points. This year, the list has come from club members by ballot and there appears to be some very challenging items to find.

You will have two months to put your lists together. We have added a few more bonus points as well, so your knowledge of your own collection will hopefully shine through in your efforts. Be sure to bring your mounted stamps to the June 10th meeting where your results will be judged and displayed. June 10th will also be our year end social and flea market, so don't forget to bring along some edible treats, and a few of those items you would like to see become part of someone else's collection. This should be a nice wrap for what has been quite a year for the NSSC.

Follow these simple rules:

- 1. All stamps must be legally issued stamps from any country in the world.
- 2. All stamps must be displayed in some fashion other than loose in an envelope. Vario sheets might work the best but if you prefer to mount the stamps on a page that works too.
- 3. Each stamp must be identified as to which category it is filling.

How to gain points:

- 1. One point for each category fulfilled.
- 2. If a stamp covers more than one category, each category AFTER the first one counts as two additional points.
 Note: A stamp featuring two or more subjects receives bonus points but only fulfils one item on the list of 24. That is to say if you have a stamp with a goat and a church on it you receive three points but you have only covered one item on the list and should find another stamp with either the goat or the church so you can cover all 24 categories.
- 3. **5 bonus points** if all categories are covered.
- 4. **5 bonus points** if stamps are from 24 different countries.
- 5. **5 bonus points** for two used stamps from different countries postmarked the same day
- 6. **One bonus point each** for largest and smallest stamp.
