VOTES FOR WOMEN - GREAT BRITAIN

In February 2018 Royal Mail issued a series of eight stamps to mark the centenary of the 1918 Representation of the People Act. The passage of this act enabled about 8.5 million women over age 30 who met a property requirement to vote, but this was only about 40 percent of the women in Great Britain. The Equal Franchise Act of 1928 allowed everyone aged 21 or over to vote. The first opportunity to vote in a general election was May 1929, when Ramsay MacDonald was elected as Primer Minister. The turnout was 76.3%.

Since the mid 1850s concern about votes for women had been simmering Although women had to pay the same taxes as men they were not allowed to vote. Various regional groups were formed that organised peaceful campaigns for women's suffrage. In 1897 the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies (NUSWW) was formed. Peaceful action produced little viable results and more militant action was needed, *Deeds not Words*. In 1903 Emmeline Pankhurst founded the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU). The militant protesters became known as suffragettes. Some disruptive action ensued, such as at-

tacks on properties. The First World War was effectively a turning point as large numbers of active men were in the forces and many jobs had to be taken on by women. The stamps, black and white photographs, illustrate the development of the suffragette movement with some of the events at the beginning of the last century before the outbreak of the first World War.


The 1907 1st class stamp shows the Women's Freedom League Poster Parade. The league was a democratic organisation formed in 1907 and advocated direct action such as passive resistance to taxation and non-cooperation with the census, rather than law breaking actions.

Suffragettes also protested singly. The 2nd class stamp shows a protester on the street in Whitehall around 1908. Protests on the pavement (sidewalk) were illegal.

During the 1908 Hungarian Exhibition at Earl's Court the WSPU organised a demonstration. The 1st class stamp shows the women with sashes in the colours of the WSPU, purple, white and green. Christabel Pankhurst, a co-founder and daughter of Emmeline is the third from the left.

Mary Leigh and Edith New were the first suffragettes to be imprisoned. On 30 June 1908 they had broken windows at 10 Downing Street, the official residence of the Prime Minster and appeared before the Bow Street Magistrates the next day. When they were released from Holloway Prison on 22 August 1908, they received a heroic welcome from the gathered crowd, £1.40 (the European letter rate for up to and including 100g) stamp.

The coronation of King George V was held on



VOTES FOR WOMEN CONTINUED

Wednesday 22 June 1911 and the suffragettes did not let the event pass unnoticed. In a coronation procession on the previous Saturday17 June organised by the WSPU many of the women wore their national dress, such as the Welsh group shown on the £1.40 stamp (world wide letter rate up to and including 20g) . The procession included a contingent of Indian suffragettes. Also on 17 June there was a Suffragette Prisoner's Pageant when each women dressed in white represented a woman imprisoned while protesting for women's suffrage. This is seen on the £1.57 stamp.

In the summer of 1913 there was a large scale demonstration organised by the NUWSS, known as the Great Pilgrimage of Suffragists which culminated on 26 July with a gathering of about 50,000 women in Hyde Park. This is seen on the 2nd class stamp.

Indian suffragettes living in London were also active. The £1.57 stamp shows Princess Sophia Duleep Singh selling *The Suffragette* outside Hampton Court Place where she lived in 1913. She had been prosecuted several times for her refusal to pay taxes.

STAMP ROOMS

When stamps were first introduced some young ladies came up with the idea of using stamps to cover their room walls. Fortunately this craze did not last too long. At least two stamp dealers had rooms where the walls

were totally decorated with stamps.



William Joseph Palmer was an early eccentric London dealer who was convinced that stamp collectors were being defrauded by masses of forgeries. Every stamp passing through his hands that he considered to be a forgery was pasted on the wall of his office. He called it *The Museum of Philately* or *A*

Chamber of Philatelic Horrors. The room became a curiosity and people travelled miles to see it. His premises at 281 Strand, London and several others on the north side of the Strand were demolished for road widening. His business never recov-

ered and the stamp room became part of history.

Charles Whitfield King's business was located in Ipswich, England. In 1887 he built his home, Morpeth House, at 99 Lacey Street, and offices on the other side of the street. During the 1880s government reprints of several countries, including the Roman States, Argentina,



Cuba, Hanover and Samoa, made it almost impossible to sell these stamps. In 1892 Charles decided to paper his library with these issues, creating dado, mosaic and frieze patterns. In total 44,052 unused stamps and 16 used British 6d stamps were used. All the unused stamps were obsolete except the Cuban ones. It took a decorator three months to create the intricate pattern. In 1894 5475 more stamps were added when a bookcase was removed. Unfortunately the decoration and the Whitfield King business are now things of the past.

CANADA POST INTERNAL HANDSTAMPS #10

CUSTOMER SERVICE CLAIMS


CENTRAL DISTRICT ONTARIO POSTAL REGION TORONTO ? ONTARIO ??

Similar to article #9, this Canada Post Departmental Internal handstamp is also a Customer Service handstamp on a letter confirming damage by fire at Postal Terminal "A" Toronto, Ontario. A subsection 'CLAIMS' handled the retrieval of all envelopes and contents, produced a memo and included all matter in a separate envelope (unknown whereabouts) forwarding to the addressee if possible or the sender if the address was unidentifiable.

At first thought there may have been a postal strike during this time with postal employees causing the fire. However, the 1974 postal strike was between the dates April 19 to 26 fighting for equal pay for the female postal code machine operators compared to mail clerks.

Of further note, this letter was dated November 25 1974 on its contents, franked with a single 15 cent stamp paying the airmail rate to Australia. Due to the poor quality strike some of the wording is unreadable.





AUSTRALIAN SILO ART

On 21 May, Australia released a set of four \$1 stamps depicting silo art, massive mural-like paintings. In part an attempt to revitalize languishing communities, "The landmark edifices, painted by renowned street artists, are attracting an increasing number of visitors who travel long distances to view the breathtaking, monumental murals that depict the local people, history and natural environment" (Australian Post Collectibles).
