# CANADA POST CELEBRATES BLACK HISTORY MONTH





Released on January 22 2021, the stamps honour the communities of Amber Valley, AB founded around 1910 by Black Americans escaping escalating racial violence and oppressive Jim Crow laws; and, Willow Grove, NB founded in 1817 by Black refugees from the War of 1812 (mostly formerly enslaved in the United States).

and the one-cent stamp of the period. Since this mailing is after Confederation, it's possible that the "Canadian" rate was used, but that doesn't explain other uses.

This item is cancelled with the Halifax H duplex (MacDonald Type HAL-24) dated Dec 31 1867. This mark originated on Jan 1, 1867, and saw use until 1875. Receipt of this notice is confirmed with a Little Glace Bay C.B. receiver dated JA 4, 1868 (J.J. MacDonald Type #201) which is designated by him as being a: "Category II—Only one copy known in philatelists' hands." This however, applied to pre-Confederation use, and it is more common after 1867.

43 x 30 mm Single oval milled outside rim Proofed May 10 1917 Another rarity I am happy to have obtained is this Ottawa, Ont. D. L. O. handstamp with a clerk or postal official's initials **I. R.**.

Initials in handstamps other than RPOs are not that common, and especially uncommon in Dead Letter handstamps. They exist on DLO handstamps in only two of 18 cities, Ottawa and Regina.

If the letters are of a postal

employee, then why are they very rarely seen? For instance, of the eight handstamps for Ottawa, four are Only Proof Known, and of the known copies only seven examples of the other four types have been reported.

Mailed close by in Upper Stewiacke, N. S. on Oc-

tober 1<sup>st</sup> 1917 to Australia (via Vancouver, B. C.), delivery failed due to the addressee being / *Deceased* /. It was then sent to the Australian Dead Letter Office per the Sydney N.S.W. handstamp on December 16<sup>th</sup> 1917 and forwarded in a closed bag to the Dead Letter Office in Canada, arriving on January 17<sup>th</sup> 1918.

This item took a full 3 and a half months during the last stages of World War I to return to the addressee.

Cover addressed to Brenton H. Collins, son of Enos Collins, at the family home "Gorsebrook" in Halifax. St. Mary's University was built on the Gorsebrook estate. The house was demolished in the 1960's. Enos Collins was a merchant, ship owner, financier, government official and founder of the Halifax Banking Company, known locally as Collins' Bank, which merged with the Canadian Bank of Commerce. He married Margaret Halliburton, daughter of Judge Brenton Hallibur-

ton. Their son was Brenton. Enos Collins died in November 18, 1871 at the age of 97. The family was still in mourning in January 1872.

# **CANADA - U.S. FRIENDSHIP COVERS**

Expression of friendship between the United States and Canada is often shown in philatelic offerings such as the three covers shown here.



The 1941 cover (figure 1) notes that the shared boundary between the two countries constitutes "The World's Most Peaceful Border" and cites the 1814 Treaty of Ghent that established a non-militarized border. It is postmarked at Niagara Falls, Ontario and at the suspension bridge transfer

The other two 1948 covers commemorate 100 years of cooperation and friendship between the two countries. The year 1948 also marked the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the completion of the railroad suspension bridge connecting the two countries in the vicinity of Niagara Falls. These two covers are unaddressed first day covers for the issuing of the Scott #961 stamp which shows the suspension bridge. The cachet on the first one (figure 2) shows the flags of Canada and the United States as they were in 1948. The Canada Unitrade #254 stamp is cancelled with a Toronto & Niagara Falls R.P.O. postmark. The other cover (figure 3) is also postmarked at the suspension bridge transfer office and, in addition, has multiple imprints for railroads that serviced the



Niagara area. They include G.T.RY.SYS (Grand Trunk Railway System), N.Y.C.& H.R.R.R. (New York City and Hudson River Rail Road), and M.C.R.R.-L.V.R.R. (Midwest Central Rail Road – Lehigh Valley Rail Road). There is also an imprint from Union Station No. 6 at Niagara Falls, New York.

#### A PLEASANT SURPRISE

We recently received a holiday card from a former Japanese exchange student who stayed with us for a year. She now lives with her husband and two young children in Singapore. The card, sent airmail on 3 December 2020, arrived at our house on 14 January 2021, and contained some lovely photos of the family. My bonus was the two stamps she used to send the card. One was from the Singapore/Israel joint issue of 2019, showing national birds for the countries: Crimson Sunbird (Singapore) and Hoopoe (Israel). More puzzling was the bird shown on the 2020 Singapore/Mongolia joint issue stamp: it appeared to be a Resplendent Quetzal, a bird of Central America (and the national bird of Guatemala). What was it doing on a Singapore stamp? The Singapore Post website provided the answer. The joint issue features traditional artwork of each country. The Singapore stamp shows a portion of a Peranakan wedding chamber beaded table cover, made up of over one million beads. The table covering features insects, birds and flowers of Asia, Europe, and South America. Why the traditional artist used South American

images is beyond me, but the quetzal is a magnificent bird, and its spectacular colours rendered in beads brings the table covering Both to life. stamps were immediately added to my collection, as I have seen the Hoopoe in Israel, and the quetzal in Cost Rica.
