LEST WE FORGET

2021 marks the 100th year (July 6 1921) of the poppy as a national symbol of remembrance in Canada. During the Great War (WWI), the appearance of the poppy on the battle scared fields of France and Belgium, inspired Lt.-Colonel John McCrae in May 1915 to quickly jot down the poem we now know as "In Flanders Fields", following the loss of a friend who died in the 2nd Battle of Ypres.

The 2021 stamp was issued on October 29 with a permanent rate in booklets of 10, and coincided with the start of the Royal Canadian Legion's Poppy Campaign.


NOVA SCOTIA STAMPS - "ODD LINE ON STAMPS" PART 3 by Robert Coulson

Robert Coulson has contributed several articles about "flyspecking" on Nova Scotia Stamps. In this second instalment, he looks at the "doctor blade flaw". He is looking for feedback from other collectors as to whether they have found similar anomalies on their Nova Scotia stamps. – ed.]

Doctor blade flaw


The "doctor blade flaw" or "ductor blade flaw" is not a rare occurrence but also not common. The doctor or doctor blade was used to clean excess ink off the plate/drum to allow ink on only the printable area. The action of the blade, which was placed at a 30-degree angle to the drum, is shown in Figure 1.

According to Library and Archives Canada, Nova Scotia's 10 cent vermillion Queen



Victoria stamp issued October 1, 1860 (Scott #12) was based on an 1843 painting by Franz Xaver Winterhalter (b. April 20, Menzenschwand, 1805. Black Forest - d. July 8, 1873, Frankfurt am Main, German Empire). There were 1,000,000 stamps issued with a perforation of 12.0 x 12.0. Figure 2 shows an example from my collection with a very strong doctor blade flaw.

The flaw was caused by a nick in the precise doctor blade so that upon wiping, a slight but definite line would appear somewhere on the sheet of stamps.



DEAD LETTER OFFICE HANDSTAMPS #64

BUREAU DES REBUT DEAD LETTER OFFICE 19 I 1948 No. 3 MONTREAL, CANADA

This cover does not have everything but almost. A combination Peace issue registered cover with War issue lower values (proper use) sent to Denmark and returned to Canada.

47 x35 mm Single frame rectangle (Wrong date used on handstamp) Originally attached is a customs declaration label stating contents as a *Christmas Gift / only*

\$1.00 from Toronto on DE 6 1948 to be mailed to Denmark. The small green box **demenage** translates to **moving** and the clear red circle label means **Closed all Postal Services.**

A total of 8 labels or cinderella items were attached in all including at the end the scarce meter tape DLO label on Jan 19 1949.

Of note in the DLO handstamp is the wrong year date of 1948 instead of 1949. This handstamp was only proofed on 3 VII 1948 further verifying the wrong date.

It will be interesting if any other DLO items with the #3 handstamp from Montreal appear with the wrong year also. As only 7 to 10 reports have been made it may be a while to prove this. As the guy from LAUGH IN used to say, 'Very interesting'.

Printers of the time would inspect the sheets on a regular basis. When this flaw was brought to their attention, they would stop the printing process to replace the doctor blade. Unlike today's high quality stamp printing, they probably would not withdraw the sheets that had the flaw.

The doctor blade flaw appears on other stamps from Canada and other countries. The flaw does not have a great deal of monetary value but is interesting for most stamp collectors.

Figure 3 shows a more modern example of a double doctor blade flaw on a Scott 593.



ALASKA TO VANCOUVER BY SHIP - 1934 by Tom Reyman

The Canadian National Steamship Company (CNSC) provided passenger ship service from Vancouver, British Columbia north to Prince Rupert, British Columbia and to the Alaska ports of Ketchikan, Sitka, Juneau, and Skagway. The CNSC used a variety of ships in their "Princess" fleet, ships named for various Princesses. The *Princess Louise* was one of the ships used on the Vancouver to Alaska run and was named in honor of the granddaughter of Queen Victoria. This ship was constructed in 1921 in the shipyards of North Vancouver and served the CNSC until it was decommissioned in 1964.

On these regular runs along the Alaska and British Columbia coast passengers on board the ship would frequently desire to post mail to friends, relatives, and acquaintances. The Princess Louise provided a service to carry these notes and letters to Vancouver for distribution into the regular Canadian Post Office system. Mail posted on board was cancelled with the Purser's handstamp at the port of call.

This cover was one that was posted at Ketchikan, Alaska on June 23, 1934 and received the red Purser's cancella-

tion. Upon arriving at Vancouver, the Post Office applied the Post Office cancellation on July 25 and placed the mailing in the regular mail system so it could be delivered to San Francisco, as addressed. Since the mailing was posted on the ship, it received the infrequently seen "Way Mail" slogan postmark (Special Service Mark #140)

PANAMA CANAL

There's a little-known philatelic angle to the story of the Panama Canal. Of course the philatelic angle of any story is generally little-known. After the French effort to build the canal through Panama had petered out, the original promoter, Philippe Bunau-Varilla, lobbied American interests to take up the project. The Americans were giving serious consideration to an alternate route through Nicaragua - which Bunau-Varilla did not favour. One of his persuasive efforts was a pamphlet entitled *Panama or Nicaragua?* in which he emphasized the presence of volcanoes as a hazard to the physical integrity of a canal through Nicaragua. To make his point he noted that countries often put representative images on their national insignia, including their postage stamps:

"Look at the coat of arms of the Republic of Nicaragua; look at the Nicaraguan postage stamps. Young nations like to put on their coats of arms what best symbolizes their moral domain or characterizes their native soil. What have Nicaraguans chosen to characterize their country on their coat of arms, on their postage stamps? Volcanoes!"

And to prove his point he included a copy of Nicaragua's then-current 1 centavo stamp of 1899 bearing an image of Mt. Momotombo, an active volcano.
