Since the last issue of The Nova Scotia Post both CAPEX22 and Novapex 2022 as well as the Annual General Meeting of the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada.

Nova Scotia Stamp Club members were well represented at all three events.

At **CAPEX22**, which took place from June 9 - 12, 2022 in Toronto, seven NSSC members presented ten single frame exhibits. In addition, two members, Gordon Smith and Bill Burden entered their websites in the Literature Competition. All of the exhibitors had outstanding results. Finally, The Nova Scotia Post was entered in the literature competition. The Post received a Vermeil medal with 80 points. Congratulations to Marty Zelenietz and all The Post contributors.

Novapex 2022 Exhibits

As the Show Co-Chair in charge of exhibits, judges and awards, I wish to thank all club members for all their support of Novapex 2022 as organizers, exhibitors, volunteers and dealers. The show welcomed 40 competitive exhibits in 102 frames with over half of those from Nova Scotia Stamp Club members. It was a great pleasure to welcome exhibitors from New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario many of whom travelled to Nova Scotia for the show. After three years, it was so nice to see familiar faces and to meet people in person I had met through Zoom meetings.

In addition to the competitive exhibits, the show included two Court of Honour exhibits Jack Forbes' "CYPRUS -King George VI Definitives Used in Making Up Postage Rates on Air Mail Items" and Jean Wang's "Blood: A Modern Medicine". Jack Forbes was the recipient of this year's Nova Scotia Stamp Club Award for his many years of service to the Nova Scotia Stamp Club as well as for his success and promotion of exhibiting at the local, national and international levels. Jean Wang's exhibit has twice won the Grand Award at national level stamp shows, first at Canpex in 2019 and again at Orapex in 2022. Wang also gave a seminar on Thematic Collecting and Exhibiting at Novapex which was likely one of the best attended seminars in show history.

Other non-competitive exhibits were a display of Nova Scotia Stamp Club memorabilia to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the Club put together by Sean Weatherup and a wonderful display of Picture Postage stamps by Dan Brooking in memory of his sister Darlene Burt. Burt, who passed away earlier this year, actively collected and studied the Picture Postage issues and maintained a website (www.picturepostage.net) as a resource for other collectors.

We had an outstanding jury who had to take on extra duty at the last minute. Much appreciation goes to Bob Anderson, Sam Chiu, Rob Lunn and Ken Lemke. At the Awards dinner, Bob Anderson, Jury Chair, announced the winners of over 30 special awards including the Multi-Frame Grand and Reserve Grand and the Single Frame Grand and Reserve Grand. On Saturday afternoon, RPSC President and jury member, Sam Chiu led a tour through the exhibits. Like Jean Wang's presentation, Sam's tour was extremely wellattended and, I think, may have sparked some to think about exhibiting in the future.

CANADIAN PICTURE POST

Darlene E. Burt, a BNAPS member since 2012, died recently in Debary, Florida. She was born in Halifax, NS and passed away on April 18, 2022 at the age of 62. Members may be particularly interested in her website called Canadian Picture Postage. To the left is a cover created by Peter Lepold of Kelowna BC with the Picture Postage stamp he designed (indicated by the red arrow) noting Burt's death. Darlene took on the responsibility for managing the site when, in 2018, Murray Munsie decided to relinquish management of the site. Munsie has volunteered to manage the website once again. 
BASEL MISSION WRAPPER

This British Victorian postal stationery wrapper with a tall brown half penny stamp was mailed from Notting Hill, London, with a Newspaper Branch cancellation on 27 March 1900 to the Rev. Johann Jakob Jaus of the Basel Mission in Codacal, Malabar, India. There is no sender indicated. The foreign printed paper at the time was ½d for up to 2 oz. Incidentally this rate was not increased until 1 May 1949.

The wrapper arrived in Codacal on 17 April, where it was redirected to Calicut arriving on 18 April and subsequently to Quilandy on 19 April. All the locations are in the same area on the southwestern coast of India. The various town cancellations are on the back.

The Basel Mission was originally founded in 1815 as the evangelical Christian German Missionary Society. It was later renamed the Basel Mission. It was Protestant а nondenominational mission from 1815 until 2001. The 1898 society report shows that the Rev. Jaus was in charge of the main Calicut station and schools with out-Stations in Collandy, Pudiarkal, Pudiangadi, Collam and Markal. There were seven other European agents* as well as several other native agents*. The photo shows the Reverend with his wife Louise.

CANADA SCORES A PHILATELIC FIRST! by Jack Forbes

June 9, 2022 saw the opening ceremonies of CAPEX22, the first ever International One Frame Philatelic Exhibition which was being held at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre, Front Street, Toronto. Led by committee chair David Mclaughlin, ably assisted by a hard-working group of volunteers, attendees were treated to almost 400 exhibits covering most aspects of stamp collecting. Additionally, there was a separate Philatelic Literature competition. Competitors came from all over the world, encouraged by just under 50 Commissioners and Jury members. The stamp exhibits were wide ranging and provided informative and interesting reading for those perusing them. There was a constant flow of observers and one had to prioritize one's viewing time to ensure that the most interesting offerings to each individual's taste were included in his or her list of "must-see's". For those who wished to add to their collections, there was a bourse, well-stocked with lots of material and featuring dealers from Canada, the United Kingdom and the United States. Canadian and Foreign Auction Houses were in attendance hoping to introduce themselves to potential bidders and sellers. Many of the philatelic societies had information tables and saw a constant flow of current members and interested collectors as the four days of the show played out. When not viewing exhibits, visiting dealers or other booth holders, show attendees were treated to a number of seminars providing insights into various aspects of collecting.



NEW SUBSEQUENT TORONTO NO. 10 HANDSTAMP - DLO # 71

In addition, the black and white stamp complements four U.S. Post Office 'Officially Sealed' labels.

The letter was originally mailed from Toronto to Pruess Station, Los Angeles CA on Dec 8, 1951. Upon arrival in Pruess Station, it was unclaimed and the address was struck through and several handstamps applied including: **Directory 131**, **BOX CLOSED** and **RETOUR** (**RETURN TO WRITER**). On Dec 20 1951, it was marked **Opened by Mistake Dead Letter Branch, Los Angeles, Calif.**

The letter was subsequently returned to Canada having been sealed by four Officially Sealed labels in the US DLO as it was opened by mistake. The use of seals

to close an opened envelope was common in not only the US DLO offices but in Canadian DLOs and around the world. An oval Toronto Post Office handstamp date coincides with the Pitney Bowes meter impression being received at the Toronto DLO on Jan 25 1952.

In the Toronto branch DLO an applied straight-lined handstamp **Opened by No. 9** has the 9 crossed out, with a new handstamp **Opened by No. 10** which is the clerk's number. This matches the boxed handstamp which indicates No. 10 dated Jan 28 1952.

Toronto is the rarest of this type of this handstamp and this is the only one known of its type. The dimensions are different at 48x33mm, and the month is spelled out whereas the other handstamps have the months in Roman numerals. Normally this could be called a replacement handstamp if there existed an original #10, however, there is no earlier version thus I call it a subsequent handstamp, as subsequent to all others proofed in 1948.

Due to the rarity of these items, it is unknown whether handstamps for #8 and #9 or later versions even exist until something is reported.
