

CANADA POST INTERNAL HANDSTAMPS #19


Letter are serif, all mixed after 'F,", period after 'Canada.'

It is always nice to see brightly coloured handstamps in various colours like green, blue, red, purple, or violet. The attached green Canada Post Internal handstamp **Postal Station F** shows up very clearly here in addition to the various five blue handstamps on the front of the cover.

Many have seen the **Original No.** in various Registration handstamps. This refers to the first number applied for the registered cover. Other numbers applied after the Original No. are called **Subsequent numbers**. This particular cover only has the large **R** in a circle to signify it as a registered cover.

I counted possibly 10 or 11 Registered number markings either manuscript or stamped. Due to the address being possibly wrong, any potential street numbers should not be confused with the registration numbers.

A short description of this cover starts with Victoria, B.C. APR 1 1916 registered to Toronto, Ont. received APR 6 1916, numerous registration Subsequent numbers, marked **Examined, NOT AT ADDRESS / UNCLAIMED** and **RETURNED TO** pointing finger. Processed via Postal Station F, Toronto on APR 7 1916 and sent back to Victoria per APR 19 1916 backstamp.



Toronto's Postal Station F was built in 1905. Located at 6 Charles St. East (at Yonge St), it was designed by Samuel George Curry (1854-1942), who was considered to be a leading figure in architecture. He also designed Postal Station C, the Bank of Montreal on Front St (which is now the Hockey Hall of Fame) as well as residential other commercial buildings. In Nova Scotia, he designed St Andrew's Presbyterian Church on Bentinck St in



Sydney which is now the Highland Arts Centre.



METERED MAIL - GREAT BRITAIN

Metered Mail is defined as mail on which the postage has been applied by a postage meter and is often used in offices instead of adding adhesive stamps. The British metered mail is usually printed in red.

Following the 1920 UPU Convention in Madrid, the use of meter mail on mail between UPU countries was approved and adopted in January 1922. One of the conditions was



that the meter marks must show the country of origin. The British Post Office adopted the new convention and the words GREAT BRITAIN, or an abbreviated form, were added.



As Great Britain had issued the first stamp the image of the sovereign and not the name continues to identify the country

of origin. The new meter mark was/is the only British stamp with an indication of the country of origin. Other meter marks continued to be used. Outgoing Rugby mail is now sorted in Coventry.



NO ONE HURT AS PLANE DELIVERING THE MAIL CRASHES ON PICTOU ISLAND

An airplane that provides postal service to Pictou Island crashed on approach on Friday June 9, 2023. The small plane went down at approximately 1:20 p.m. with the pilot and co-pilot onboard. No one was injured, according to RCMP Cpl. Chris Marshall. Marshall said the fire department and Emergency Health Services were dispatched to the scene. The RCMP were unable to comment further. The investigation is being taken over by Transport Canada.

A statement from Canada Post on Friday said mail was recovered and taken to the Pictou Island post office.

HUMBOLDT UNIVERSITY

The Humboldt University is not in Humboldt, Saskatchewan, but Berlin.





The Universität zu Berlin was founded in 1809 by Friedrich

Wilhelm III on Unter den Linden, acting on the initiative of among others the von Humbolt brothers, Alexander, 1869 – 1859, and Wilhelm, 1767 - 1835. It opened in 1810. Alexander, naturalist, geographer, explorer and biologist, was one of the most prominent scientists of his time and was author of the book Kosmos, A Sketch of the Physical Description of the Universe, that has been translated into many languages and is available on line. Wilhelm as a distinguished philosopher and diplomat. Unter den Linden is one of the mail streets in central Berlin, leading to the Brandenburg Gate. In 1828 it was renamed Friedrichs-Wilhelms- Universität. In 1949 being on Unter den Linden in East Berlin, it was renamed Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin, honouring Alexander and Wilhelm. Since German reunification in 1990, it has reestablished its international reputation.

To mark the sesquicentennial of the university in 1960 two stamps





were issued by the DDR (German Democratic Republic). The 20 Pf stamps shows the university with statues of Wilhelm on the left and Alexander on the right. The 25Pf stamp has the logo of the university with Wilhelm superimposed on Alexander. In 1985 for the 175th anniversary of the university the DDR issued a 20Pf stamp show-



ing the centre portion of the main building facing Unter den Linden.


RECENT HALIFAX POSTMARK

In September and October 2021, I wrote in these pages about the frequency of "skips" (letters with uncancelled stamps) coming from Halifax. I based my information on covers retained by my children in Ontario and Manitoba, who each receive a weekly letter from me. I occasionally see hand cancellations that indicate manual sorting, either in Halifax or the destination city. In examining the covers collected between January and May this year, I came across two examples of a "different" Halifax CDS applied to covers that had escaped cancellation in the automated machinery (both lack the neon orange sorting information on the back). Struck in violet, the cancel measures approximately 1 ¾ inches in diameter. The earliest example (top) apparently lacks a date and simply bears the text "Canada Post/ Halifax/NS" in sans serif lettering. The second strike, dated "2023-04-27" shows distortion and rapid deterioration of the hammer.

I believe that the cancel was introduced early this year (2023), because it is not evident on the covers accumulated in 2022. I also suspect that the cancel is no longer in service, as it shows signs of very rapid deterioration.
